Campaign Statements From Candidates At The May 21 Primary Election

 I am 36 years of age, married, and have four children. Joined Klamath Falls police department and received my first law enforcement experience under the expert hand of the late police chief, Frank Hamm, now deceased. During that time I held positions of patrolman, car patrol, and desk sergeant.

I resigned in 1943 to accept appointment as assistant chief of police of internal security of the department of interior. Six months later I was promoted to chief of investigation unit, and this position I held until 1945 when called into the U. S. army. After receiving honorable discharge I returned to my former position with the federal government. This job was abolished in 1946. During my work with the government, I was under close supervision of Willard E. Schmidt, professor and dean of police science and penology of San Jose state college. My work consisted of conducting the most important internal security investigations, acting virtually independently and with wide responsibility in all cases including those of an emergency nature. Performed intelligence work aimed at unobscuring and preventing subversive and other organized activities aimed at our government. Conducted classes in the techniques of crime detection and the development of physical agility. Also had charge of the records bureau and dealt with keeping complete crime records.

In January 1947 I accepted present position as police chief of Chiloquin, Ore. July 1, 1947, was commissioned deputy special officer of the Indian service in conjunction with my police chief job. Since I have been a peace officer, it has always been my practise to work one hundred per cent will, all law enforcement agencies in our county and state and shall continue to do so if elected.

I will strive to promote clean, wholesome activities intended to include the entire juvenile population of Klamath county aimed at developing in children generally a sense of being on the side of law and order. I will work with the juvenile court, principals and teachers of schools, counsels of churches or the child's pastor to better the youth of Klamath county.

I'm fully aware that the sheriff's position does not only include being law preservation of his county, but is the supervisor of tax collectors which is a tremendous task but while attending school, I majored in business administration which will help in supervision of the tax office.

I'm affiliated with the Oregon juvenile council, Oregon Association of City Police Officers, Footprinters, American Legion, Eagle lodge, International Pacific Coast Peace Officers association.

Due to the long law enforcement experience that I have enjoyed in Klamath county, I feel that I know the public and understand what they want and expect of their sheriff. I will give my undivided attention to every minor detail, be prompt and impartial and give Klamath county a good clean administration. I sincerely solicit your support.

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Tax Evasion Case Probed

PORTLAND, April 28 (AP)—E. O. Stratton, operator of a Pendleton hotel pleaded guilty in federal court here yesterday to a charge of income tax evasion on failure to report \$8000 of taxable income in 1944.

Judge Claude McCulloch referred the case to a probation officer for a pre-sentence investigation.

A second charge in the indictment, involving failure to report \$13,000 of taxable income in 1945, was dismissed on recommendation of the district attorney's office.

Defense attorneys for Stratton told the court the defendant had not deliberately understated his taxable income. They argued that he had put the money owed the government aside from slot machine profits to keep the machine operator in the dark as to the machine revenues. His attorneys have deposited \$42,000 to cover the total of unreported taxes, plus a 50 per cent penalty.

Scout Camp Lease Okayed

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—The interior department approved today the transfer of a 50-year lease to an 80-acre Boy Scout camp near Roseburg, Ore.

In January 1927 congress authorized the secretary of the interior to lease the land, on Wolf creek, to the Douglas county Boy Scout council. The tenants were required to report to the department annually on the use made of the land, and they have done this faithfully for 21 years.

In 1944 the Douglas county council was consolidated with the Lane county council and other Scout organizations to form the Oregon Trail Council, Inc., with headquarters at Eugene. The department's approval was for the transfer of the unexpired term of the lease to the Oregon Trail Council.

The department said the Wolf creek camp is the only one of its kind established by special act of congress.

Traction Strike Vote Set Friday

PORTLAND, April 29 (AP)—Portland Traction company employees will take a strike vote Friday.

Alex Bain, business agent for the AFL drivers and mechanics said if the strike is approved, it will be called at 12:31 a. m. May 17 unless a wage agreement is reached with the company earlier.

The union has asked a 25-cent hourly increase. The company's offers have been contingent on getting a fare increase—denied by the city council—and Bain said "we cannot take any such offers back to our members."

Present scales range from \$1.40 for drivers to \$1.55 for mechanics. Negotiations have been under way since January.
