Social Security Man Here Answers Insurance Queries

A large number of people have made inquiry at the social security administration office as a result of the article regarding old-age and survivors insurance which appeared in The Herald and News recently. The following questions which were asked by several individuals were answered today by John Richardson, manager of the local social security office:

Question: Does everyone have to have forty calendar quarters in which \$50 was earned in order to be insured?

Answer: No. The amount of covered work required is based on your age. The old worker requires less.

Question: Do I have to retire permanently in order to receive old-age and survivors insurance benefits?

Answer: No. If you are 65 and have enough covered work on your record, you can draw a monthly benefit for every calendar month in which your earnings in covered employment are less than fifteen dollars.

Question: How can the monthly payments now being made amount to \$10,000 or more?

Answer: The following case is not unusual. A man who has been making \$200 per month since January 1, 1937, dies. He leaves a widow and two children aged 2 and 4. The widow receives \$68.60 per month until the four-year-old is 18. That's \$823.20 a year for 14 years or \$11,524.80. The payments continue at a slightly lower rate until the younger child is 18, and when the
