

# Reds Alone On Plans For May Day Rite

LONDON, April 27 (AP)—The communists will have to celebrate May Day on their own this year in most of Western Europe's democratic capitals.

Socialists and moderate labor groups are giving the communists the cold shoulder as never before in planning for the traditional labor celebration Saturday.

May Day was established as an international labor holiday in 1890 at a socialist congress in Paris. In most countries it has become Labor Day. The Russians have made it a national holiday, and this year they plan one of their biggest celebrations in Moscow.

Huge pictures of Lenin, Stalin and other bolshevik leaders have been placed on buildings, and the city is going all-out in decorations. The Russians are combining celebrations, since May 1 is the third anniversary of the entrance of Russian troops into Berlin.

In Western Europe, however, the communists generally find themselves snubbed.

Dual celebrations, in some cases for the first time, were called by communists and non-communists in London, Oslo, Paris, Berlin, Amsterdam, Brussels and Copenhagen.

Even in Finland, which recently concluded a mutual assistance pact with Russia, social democrats and communists called for separate rallies in Helsinki and some other communities.

Finnish communists adopted as their May Day slogan: "Freedom, democracy, peace, friendship with the Soviet Union which will guarantee peace in Finland, a collective fight to crush the powers of capitalism and finally, land to all those who need it."

The social democrat slogan: "Democracy."

Police throughout Europe, with the possible exception of Italy and Trieste, took a calm view of the coming celebrations. In prior years May Day has often led to sharp disorders.

## Spanish Stowaways Reach Venezuela

SEATTLE, April 27 (AP)—Six Spanish stowaways, detained five months at a U.S. airport at Coos Bay, Ore., have reached Caracas, Venezuela.

They notified Immigration Director R. P. Bonham here yesterday of their safe arrival.

The men stowed away in France and were taken into custody by immigration officials when they arrived at Coos Bay. The men were sent to Venezuela through funds supplied by a campaign started by Irvin Goodman, Portland attorney.

## New Dorm To Be Built At University

EUGENE, April 27 (AP)—A power shovel broke earth at the University of Oregon yesterday for construction of a new women's dormitory, the first major development on the campus in nine years.

The \$1,500,000 building, to house 333 girls, is to be financed from rooming fees. It is the first of five new projects. The dormitory is to be completed within a year.

## Milk Price Set At 20 Cents

PORTLAND, April 27 (AP)—A retail milk price of 20 cents a quart has been established as the minimum for Jackson and Lane counties effective May 1.

The state milk control board set the price for milk of 3.2 to 3.8 per cent butterfat content. Milk with 3.9 to 4.3 per cent butterfat was set at 21 cents a quart. Richer milk levels were set at 22 and 24 cents a quart.

The board also ordered producers to sell only in the market area to which they were accredited.

## Road Fund To Be Allowed

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—Oregon's federal aid highway program on last March 31 called for construction of 504.1 miles of highway costing \$24,514,000 with the federal government paying \$13,217,000.

The public roads administration in announcing the figures said the state has an unprogrammed balance of federal money coming to it of \$1,200,000.

It said that Oregon's programmed roads call for construction of 152.1 miles costing \$8,957,000, with the government paying \$4,819,000. It said plans have been approved for, but construction not started on, 97.1 miles of highway to cost \$3,319,000 with federal payment amounting to \$1,699,000.

It said that construction is under way on 254.9 miles of highway, costing \$12,238,000 with federal funds amounting to \$6,699,000.

SPOKANE, April 27 (AP)—Northwest hospitals received none of the glucose solution which reportedly injured hospital patients in South-eastern United States. It was announced here today.

Robert T. Ullsh, Northwest manager of Cutter Laboratories, said the shipment was made from the Cutter laboratory in Berkeley, Calif., to Jacksonville, Fla.

"A check of our records of shipments to Washington, Idaho, Oregon and Montana verifies beyond any doubt that none of the bottles of solution in question reached hospitals in this area," he said.
