SALEM, April 29 (AP)—Marion county's registration for the May 21 primary election is greater than for any other primary.

Juvenile Ruling Handed Down

SALEM, April 29 (AP)—Boys and girls committed to the state training schools cannot be classified as criminals, Attorney General George Neuner ruled today for the state board of control.

Neuner ruled that the state training school for boys at Woodburn and the Hillcrest school for girls at Salem are not penal institutions, and that their function is to protect their inmates rather than to punish them. He said they are classified as delinquent or dependent children, instead of as criminals.
