Jim Owens was elected to the job of student body president in the re-vote run-off Wednesday between Owens and Dick Jackstadt. Owens won the position by more than a 150-vote majority, bringing in 609 votes to Jackstadt's 345.

Other officers proved to be Colleen Creswell, secretary-treasurer; in the closest race of the election, Colleen received 449 votes to Beverly Young's 402. New second vice president will be Ed Zarosinski, receiving 64 votes. His running mate, Rod Davh, brought in 319 votes.

Taking over Jim Crisman's job as yell leader at the end of the year will be John Baker. Baker pulled in 528 votes to Patsy Kennett's 322. Route Lowell won the office of first vice president with the only majority received in the first election.

The regular poll method of voting was used in these elections this year, with voting booths and election boards set up in the libraries. The number of students voting totaled about 800; approximately 300 less than were attending school that day. By this system, a person does not vote unless he wants, or has time.

Truman Blasts Trade Move

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—President Truman said today (AP) by the republican congress to extend the reciprocal trade program would sabotage an important part of U. S. foreign policy and the European recovery program.

Mr. Truman noted at news conference that some of European recovery funds will be extended as loans. He said if they are unable to carry on the trade that is possible under the reciprocal program.

He described as a most terrible thing a reported move to deny the president for a year the authority to negotiate new agreements under the trade program.

He made this reply when a reporter mentioned what he said was such a proposal.

Mr. Truman said the trade program was an integral part of American foreign policy and that of the European recovery program itself.

The trade act is due to die June 12 unless extended by congress. Under the 14-year-old law, the administration is permitted to enter into tariff-cutting agreements with other countries in an effort to spur trade.

Mr. Truman has asked congress for a three-year extension. Republican leaders have been cool to the request and have talked of at least making several changes in the act.
