Strike Threat Props Grains

CHICAGO, April 29 (AP)—A railroad strike threat aided in propping grain prices on the board of trade today, particularly May contracts. But official expressions of optimism over the prospect of avoiding the strike caused the gains to be reduced or eliminated in late dealings.

Also helping grain prices was a boost in the government buying price for wheat, a pick-up in domestic flour business in the Northwest and increased demand for feed grains from the East.

Wheat closed unchanged to 2 cents higher, May \$2.46-2.47, corn was unchanged to a cent lower, May \$2.21-2.21 1/2. Oats were 1/4-1/2 lower, May \$1.10-1.10 1/2, and soybeans were 1/4-1/2 lower to 2 cents higher, May \$4.04.

Oils Range Upward Today

NEW YORK, April 29 (AP)—Demand for oil company issues dominated the stock market today. Gains for the oils ranged to more than two points toward the close of trading. Ralls stood in front throughout the day, too, but the rest of the market seemed to have trouble deciding which way to go.

Steel company issues, for instance, swung this way and that up to the final hour, when they suddenly advanced. Youngstown sheet added a point or so, and smaller gains were posted for U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, and Republic.

Liquor stocks, on the other hand, tended downward most of the day until the decline picked up momentum in late business. National Distillers and Distillers Corp.—Seagram were on the minus column in that group.

Total volume held at the 1,000,000 share-plus rate which has marked most of this month's trading. Bonds showed spotty improvement while wheat and cotton advanced.

Stock Market Strike Ended

NEW YORK, April 29 (AP)—Union employees today ended their month-long, violence-punctuated strike against the New York stock exchange by accepting pay raises offered by the financial market.

The walkout was marked by several disturbances and one major clash with police when pickets demonstrated by laying down in the streets.

A spokesman for the exchange said 100 of the union-estimated 650 strikers would not be taken back. Meanwhile, the strike continued against four brokerage houses to which the walkout spread.

The stock exchange offer accepted today provided \$3 weekly for those earning up to \$49, \$4 for those earning between \$49 and \$74, and \$5 weekly for those earning more than \$74.

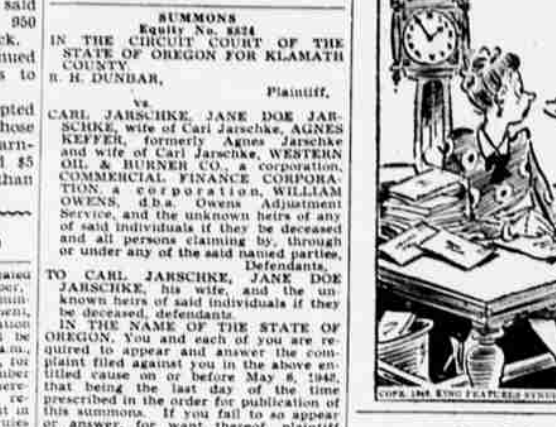
