The unit will again meet in September at the Midland grange hall for the Rally Day meeting.

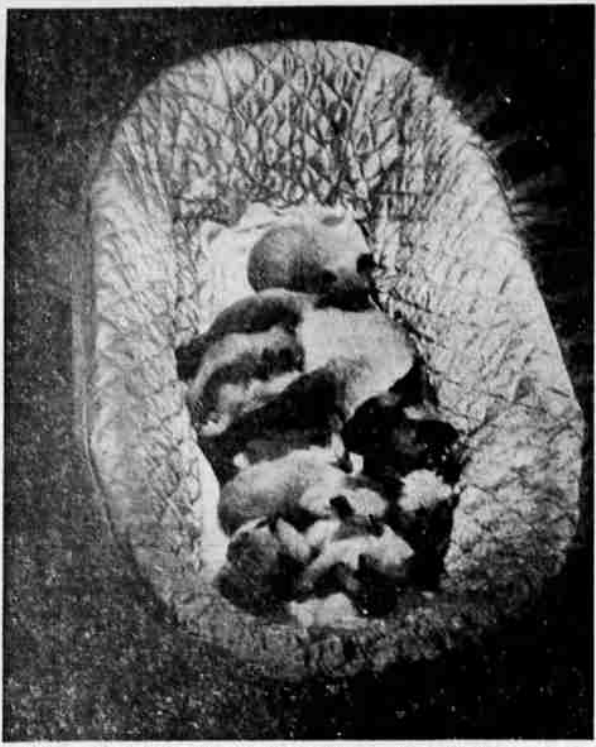
Outlook For US Fruit Export NG

WASHINGTON, April 30 (P)—The agriculture department said Thursday prospects of American fruits regaining prewar markets in Europe are not very bright.

This statement was based on a survey made recently by F. A. Mote, a department fruit marketing specialist.

Before the war, exports of fruits and fruit products averaged \$89,000,000 annually, mostly to Europe. Mote said a shortage of dollars may lead Europe to seek fruit supplies elsewhere. He said European governments look upon fruit as a luxury and will tend to use what dollars they have only for purchase of essential foods and raw materials.

Confederate Flag Needed Again

BALTIMORE, April 30 (P)—This city is advertising for Confederate battle flags—but hold your fire, Yankees.

There's no rebirth of the Civil war in prospect; it's just the monument city getting ready to dedicate another statue.

This one is an enormous job in bronze, depicting Generals Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson parting on the night before the battle of Chancellorsville, where Jackson was shot accidentally by one of his own troops.

The statue is to be dedicated Saturday, just 85 years after the battle, and the Confederate battle standards are wanted to decorate the site of the unveiling.

Navy Task Force Reaches Norway

BERGEN, Norway, April 30 (P)—A U. S. navy task force headed by the carrier Valley Forge reached Bergen Thursday on a goodwill visit to Norway. Guns of the fortress Bergenhus returned the ships' salutes. Norwegian military and civilian officials met the ships' officers. The American sailors and marines started a snowball fight on the piers.

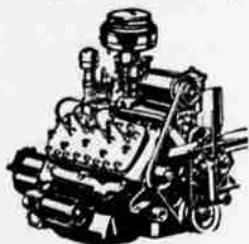
