Community Property Repeal Move On

PORTLAND, April 30 (AP)—A move to repeal Oregon's new community property law was reported here today.

Opponents of the law said the new federal tax bill does away with the need for the state law, and provides some improvements over the Oregon statute. They indicated they would ask repeal at the next legislative session.

The law was passed to enable husband and wife to divide income for tax purposes.

Supporters of the Oregon law said there might be need for amendment, but that they would fight any repeal attempt.

Overhead passenger cars, running suspended from a single track, have been proposed as a solution for street traffic congestion in large cities.

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Tickets On Sale For Choral Show

Tickets for the Klamath Chorus concert to be given at the Oregon Vocational school auditorium on May 13, are now on sale at the chamber of commerce and at the OVS office.

The concert will feature in costume, the colorful and dramatic musical legend, "The Lonesome Train." This number was presented to a capacity crowd at the Hollywood Bowl recently, and was very well received. The composers are the same who produced the popular "Ballad for Americans."

The proceeds of the concert will be applied on the Lilly Darby Memorial fund for the purchase of fine music records to be placed in the county library. Prices of tickets are 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students, including high school, grade school, OVS and students of county schools.

Seats 1300

The OVS auditorium seats 1300 persons. Its acoustics is said to be very fine, and the hall is considered one of the best in the Klamath area for presentation of any kind of program. Adjacent parking space is ample and the excellent paved highway from Klamath Falls affords easy access.

The chorus is mixed and includes many of the outstanding singers of the community. The concert program will include other numbers besides the feature and has been arranged to suit all tastes. Music will be under the direction of Andrew J. Loney. However, the chorus of 40 voices is not a school organization, but is a civic enterprise, to which Loney and all participants donate their time and efforts.

New Half Dollar In Circulation

PHILADELPHIA, April 30 (AP)—A new half-dollar, honoring Benjamin Franklin, went into circulation today.

The coin, designed by the late John Sinnock who sculptured the Roosevelt dime and Purple Heart medal, is the idea of Mint Director Nellie Taylor Ross.

"It is really appropriate that the Franklin half-dollar becomes a reality at this time," said Mrs. Ross. "He was the great apostle of thrift and his picture on the coin should remind people that in this time of world unrest it would be a good policy to husband our resources."

Three Injured By Falling Tree

BEND, April 30 (AP)—Three men were recovering here today from injuries suffered when pinned under a falling tree in an isolated forest area west of here.

They were Nolan Rasnick, 26, and James Rorer, 19, both of Detroit, and John Mason, 22, Woodburn. A 40-foot tree they felled on Blowout creek south of Detroit trapped them.

It was an hour before help reached them. They were hospitalized here. The Woodburn youth was the least hurt. The others had bone fractures.

LOS ANGELES, April 30 (AP)—The French girl lost her man and wants her dowry returned.
