

Bishop Hits Attack On Communism

BOSTON, April 30 (AP)—Methodist Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam attributes what he describes as "declaration of a holy war on communism" to those who seek to retain their power, property and prestige.

The New York church leader, addressing the Methodist general conference Wednesday night, said: "There is an approach, somewhat camouflaged by ponderous phrasing and scholastic style that in effect is out the declaration of a holy war on communism."

"The real purpose that lies behind the war is to retain the power, the prosperity and the prestige possessed by those who advocate it."

Bishop Oxnam did not identify those he described as the aggressors. The bishop's 24,000 word, two and one-half hour Episcopal address represented the convictions of the entire Methodist Council of Bishops.

He said Methodism rejects communism. "But," he added, "we know that the only way to defeat it permanently is to use the freedom of our own democracy to establish economic justice and racial brotherhood."

The address set forth Methodism's stand on spiritual, national and international issues.

Bishop Francis J. McConnell of Portland, Ore. today led the general conference in prayer as the church's legislative body opened its first full session of a 10-day gathering.

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Radar To Be Used To Tell Glacier Size

PASADENA, Calif., April 30 (AP)—Scientists are going to try to measure the thickness of glaciers by radar for the first time this summer.

Through the experiments, announced today by the California Institute of Technology which will send an expedition to Alaska, scientists hope to learn more of the pressures and flow of glaciers.

The expedition also plans to study the rate of glacier melting by scattering 10 pounds of a yellow dye, used during the war on life rafts on Seward glacier.

Knowledge gained from this experiment is expected to help the city of Tacoma in determining its anticipated water supply. One of Tacoma's sources of water is a river from Mt. Rainier's Nisqually glacier.

The Caltech expedition will leave Pasadena June 13 and return in September. Dr. R. P. Sharpe, professor of geomorphology, heads the group which will include three graduate students.

At Seattle they will join an expedition of the Arctic Institute of North America, a joint U.S.-Canadian venture to explore St. Elias mountain range along the Alaska-Yukon border.
