

Western Pine Officers To Discuss Plans For Raising Trees On California Plots

Methods and plans for growing more and more trees in California to meet future needs for timber will be a main topic for discussion at an all-day meeting May 6 in San Francisco of the Western Pine association's California forest practice committee. The meeting is to be at the Sir Francis Drake hotel and will be attended in the afternoon by state and federal forestry men who will join with industry leaders in a survey of mutual problems.

In announcing the meeting, Stuart Moir, of Portland, chief association forester, said lumber production in the pine region of California is now at record-breaking levels. Recent estimates indicate a probable output of 2,750,000,000 feet in 1948 by the 700-odd sawmills in the region, he said. This is the largest volume of production ever attained in the state.

Elmer E. Hall, veteran logging manager of the McCloud River Lumber company of McCloud, is chairman of the forest practice committee and will preside at the session. The Western pine industry's efforts to cooperate with the state in growing more trees are to be discussed, said Forester Moir. "To maintain our timber economy we must keep the timber growing on all our forest lands. It is a renewing resource and proper forest practices such as called for in California state laws and Western pine industry timber harvesting standards, help the forest in producing new wood. To meet unprecedented needs such as we have now, we know we must keep on growing more and more timber. Industry wants to do all it can to maintain the supply." Moir said fire protection in California is of particular concern be-

cause of the great increase in population and new settlements in the forested areas. The fire hazard has been heightened also by several unusually dry seasons in succession.

"The lumber industry is exerting every effort to prepare fire plans that will prevent fires in the woods," he added. "But no plan can be fully successful without the complete cooperation of the public in preventing fires. Recent start of the Keep California Green movement should do a good deal to make the public forest-fire conscious and reduce the number of fires ordinarily caused by public carelessness."

"The matter of fire prevention during the hunting season is also to come up for committee discussion, and the support of sportsmen will be sought in an effective fire prevention program during the 1948 season."

85,000 Farm Workers Needed

SOC Confab Plans Made

Plans for the annual Southern Oregon education conference which is to be held on November 4 and 5 at Southern Oregon college, have just been revealed by Dr. E. N. Stevenson, president of the college.
