Hidden Bomb Kills Briton

WOLVERHAMPTON, England, May 4 (AP)—A parcel bomb addressed to Capt. Ray Farran, acquitted of killing a Jewish boy in Palestine, exploded Monday, killing his brother, Rex Farran, 26.

The bomb, enclosed in a copy of Shakespeare's plays, was delivered at the Farran home this morning.

Young Farran was alone in the house. The explosion shattered windows.

Police said the parcel was mailed in England. The inside of the book had been cut away to make room for the bomb.

The Jewish youth, Alexander Rubowitz, 18, disappeared last May 6. The Stern gang, Jewish underground organization in Palestine, claimed him as a member. The military court which acquitted Roy Farran ruled that Rubowitz had not been proved dead. He was abducted while posing signs for the Jewish underground. The prosecution based its case largely on a light gray hat which it said was found nearby and bore the name Farran.

In February King George VI decorated Farran for valor in the French and Italian campaigns.

Esplanade Closed Today

The Oregon state highway department Monday closed three streets leading into the Hot Springs area as work progressed on the big north entrance project.

Esplanade was closed on both sides of the canal, at Spring and Alameda, and Fremont and Manzanita streets were closed on both sides of the railroad track.

Left open for traffic movement to Hot Springs was the Portland street railroad crossing, and the Main street canal bridge which will route traffic past Hillside hospital.

Fremont and Manzanita crossings are closed permanently. The canal crossing at Esplanade will remain closed during the entire project.

Crews were busy ripping up pavement under the Esplanade railroad overhead. This stretch is to be deepened as well as widened.

Grading is progressing on schedule to the north, Jack Wilson, drilling for hot water near the Esplanade underpass, reported the drillings down approximately 100 feet.

Penney Show Wins Prize

The contest, which was opened to the 696 retail stores that carry official Girl Scout equipment, was based on the theme "Girl Scouts Look to the Future." Judging was on the basis of originality and execution. Judges included Mrs. Geoffrey Hall, free lance display artist, and Samuel Smith, display manager for DePenna, New York city.

Driver Faces Hit-Run Charge

A charge of failure to stop at the scene of an accident, growing out of damage done to a gas pump at Chemult, was lodged against Ben Balchunas, 44, Tacoma, Wash. motorist, who was picked up by state police on Sunday morning near the north city limits.

The complaint was filed by Orville E. Farris, owner of the service station at Chemult. Balchunas, who was en route here with his aged mother for a visit with his sister at Pelican, was posted \$150 bail to appear late today in justice court.

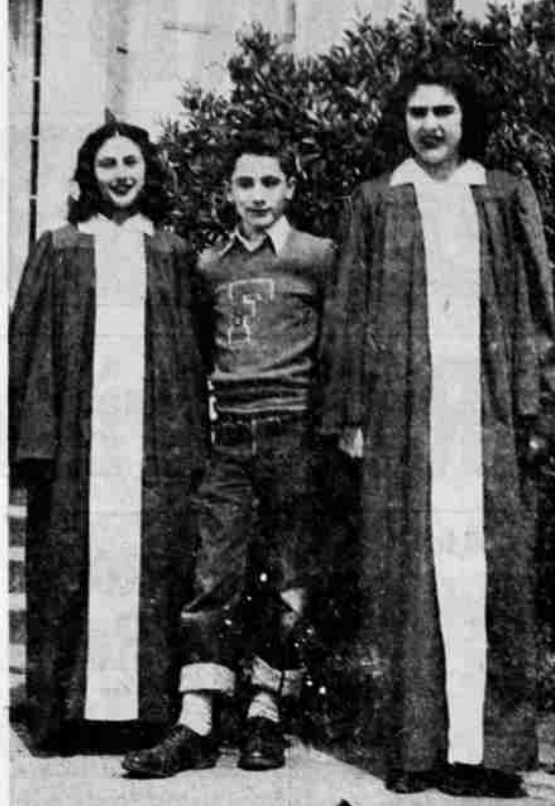
Balchunas is reported to have said he backed into the pump at about 6 a. m. and as no one was around intended to stop on his way back home and report his part in the incident.

Soloists and ensembles receiving a 2 rating from Klamath were Wilber Elliott, boys high voice; Joanne Robinette, piano; James Griggs, French horn; Lois Larson, clarinet; the clarinet solo quartet composed of Geraldine Lewis, Don Roquemore, Lois Larson and Ruth Peyton; Rosalie Swedin in the girl's low voice division received a 3 or rating of "good".

In the junior division contest (9th grade and below) George Vlahos of Fremont school walked off with the honors in the clarinet contest, receiving a "1" and Wayne Angel of Mills school received a "1" in the violin solo event.

Highway Crash Sends Trio To Hospital; Cycle Rider Injured

Several persons were hospitalized over the week-end as the result of traffic accidents, including one motorcycle upset.

A two-car crash between Crescent and Chemult on Highway 97 at 11:30 a. m. Sunday, sent three persons to Hillside hospital. Mr. and Mrs. Lester Ingram of Crescent were occupants of one car and riding in the second machine were Dick Rose and Paul Petrusky, both of Everett, Wash.

Ingram was driving north when he said something went wrong with the steering apparatus. The two cars crashed. Mrs. Ingram suffered multiple hurts including a fractured ankle and a jaw injury. She remains in Hillside but her husband was treated for a hand injury and dismissed. It is understood two children were in the car but were uninjured.

Kaler's ambulance brought Mr. and Mrs. Ingram and Petrusky to the hospital. Petrusky was treated for head injuries and dismissed. Rose remained at Chemult to take charge of the wrecked car.

Cresby Lamont, 33-year-old rancher living at route 2 box 266, Klamath Falls, is being treated at Klamath Valley hospital for hurts received at 7:30 p. m. Four Found In Cabin Of Burned Plane

ELENSBURG, May 4 (AP)—A four and a half months search for four missing civilian fliers was ended Monday with the removal of their bodies from the wreckage of their plane 15 miles southwest of Elensburg.

The shattered, partly burned plane was found yesterday by a fence rider for an Elensburg stockman. Kittitas county Sheriff Gus Lindeman reported.

The four men, who disappeared in a snowstorm December 21 while on a training flight from here to Klamath Falls, Ore., were Lawrence E. Short, Elensburg; the pilot, E. G. Young, Elensburg; Thomas Bottel, Thorp, and Dan Ingalls, Yakima.

Lindeman said the plane crashed on the Wenas side of Shushuquin pass and struck a felled tree. The wreckage indicated the pilot had turned back and attempted to reach his home port in the storm.

Tax Problem Is Really Problem

PHILADELPHIA, May 4 (AP)—Filling out income tax forms for an itinerant day-laborer was more than just a headache—it was practically a steady job.

Francis R. Smith, collector of internal revenue for the Philadelphia district, said yesterday that a man who listed his occupation as "freight unloader" turned in 104 W-2 short forms to complete his tax return for 1947.

Smith said the man, father of three small children, was employed by 51 different firms in seven states during the last year to account for the difference between the number of forms and job totals.

The government, Smith added, re-funded the new record holder \$100 in tax overpayment on his \$80-a-week average pay.

Italian Cabby Very Confident

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)—A Chico, Tex. woman returned from Italy today with this personal message from a Naples taxi driver to President Truman:

"Tell him in Italy we're going to get rid of our Communists before you do in America."

Mrs. Henry C. Guldage, wife of an official of the Standard Oil Co. of Egypt, who arrived with her husband aboard the liner Sobieski, said the driver thought she'd have no difficulty delivering his message personally to the president.

Robber Gives Up After Bank Theft

HUNTSVILLE, Tex., May 4 (AP)—Sheriff Lloyd Farris said charges would be filed today against a 21-year-old man who gave himself up three hours after the new Waverly State bank, 12 miles south of here, was robbed yesterday.

Farris said he had recovered \$1924 before the man gave himself up. A check with the bank indicated this was about \$129 short of the amount stolen, he said.

Farris said the man, whom he identified as William Carl Sullivan of Riverside, Tex., signed a written statement admitting the robbery.
