McNutt On Grazing Job With Shasta

MOUNT SHASTA, May 5.—Appointment of Jack J. McNutt as recreation and grazing technician on the Shasta national forest was announced today by Forest Supervisor Roberts E. Jones.

"McNutt comes to the Shasta forest with an excellent background of experience which will be of considerable value in the development of the Shasta lake area," said Supervisor Jones. "The area comes under forest service administration July 1."

A graduate of forestry school at Colorado A & M, McNutt entered the U. S. forest service in 1938 after five years' experience as a park ranger in Yellowstone National park. Subsequently, he served as district forest ranger and assistant forest supervisor in Nevada and Idaho on the Toiyabe and Caribou National forests. As district forest ranger at Las Vegas, Nevada, he was in charge of the Charleston mountain division of Toiyabe National forest, one of the most popular recreation areas in Nevada.

For the past two years he has been on special assignment with the Society of American Foresters at Washington, D. C.

Fatal Shooting Of Indian Probed

MADRAS, May 5 (AP)—Police are investigating the fatal shooting of Milton Peters, 34, Warm Springs reservation Indian.

J. W. Elliott, reservation superintendent, said the FBI and Wasco county authorities have entered the case. Peters was wounded Sunday night by Paul Queheema, reservation policeman, who tried to arrest him.

Elliott said the officer apparently acted in self defense after the Indian and several companions started to leave rocks at Queheema after he intercepted a car in which they were riding.

Peters is survived by his widow. They lived at Slinnasho.

Ticket Killing Punishment Asked

TRENTON, N. J., May 5 (AP)—Ticket killing would be punishable by a jail term up to three years, a fine up to \$1000, or both, under a new bill in the legislature Tuesday.

The legislature, introduced in the state senate yesterday by Arthur C. Clapp (R-Essex), would make ticket killing or its attempt a misdemeanor. Clapp said enforcement of the traffic laws was impossible without teeth in a law to ban ticket killing.

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
