

Schools Combine To Give Annual Spring Pelicana Talent Show For Public

Students from public grade schools, Sacred Heart academy, representatives of Oregon Vocational school, Altamont Junior high and Klamath Union high school combined last night in the presentation of the annual spring Pelicana broadcast and talent show.

A near-capacity crowd filled the KUHS auditorium to witness proceedings and were entertained for some 90 minutes by talent from various schools.

The first part of the program, broadcast over station KFJI and sponsored by the chamber of commerce featured a lineup of music ensembles from several grade schools and SHA, along with the OVS-sponsored barbershop quartet and the KU band. Billy Houser, of Conger school, gave the lone non-musical act—his reading, "Our Hired Girl," virtually stole the show.

April Is Cold Month For Klamath

April was a cold month—six degrees colder than the 55-year average.

The reclamation bureau weather report for April showed today that the mean maximum for the month was 50 degrees and the mean minimum 31 degrees, or a monthly mean of 40.5 degrees. This is 6.1 degrees under the April mean for the observed period of over half a century.

While total precipitation of 1.23 inches for the month was not unusual, the weather observer noted that 21 days of the month recorded a trace or more of precipitation—which is unusual.
