## Beavers Blanked 9-0 By Seals On Pair Of Singles

The best was on Will Hafey stepped into the pitcher's box last night in Sacramento. A few hours earlier, the Oakland club announced it had sold Hafey, for 1949 delivery, to the Cleveland Indians for about \$100,000 and the immediate delivery by Cleveland of Les Webber and George Metkovich.

Hafey, 26-year-old righthander, had to make his sale look good. He did it. He pitched the Oaks to a 5 to 1 victory over the Bolons. He gave up only four hits and, in his own behalf, socked a double and a single.

Until the ninth Hafey had the Seals shut out. Ted Jennings then singled. Joe Grace doubled and the veteran Rip Russell hit a long fly to right that enabled Jennings to race home.

San Francisco stayed in first place by reason of the 9-0 shutout hurled by Manny Perez, the reformed Hollywoodian. Manny was in rare form as he limited the Portland Beavers to two hits to register his fifth win of the year. One of the hits was scratchy, the other a solid single by Ed Basinski.

### FREQUENT PASSES

In contrast to Perez' pitching was the miserable showing of the Beaver hurler. They gave up 12 bases on hits. The Seals scored four runs on one hit off Andy Sierra in the sixth frame.

Los Angeles scored its second successive extra-inning victory over Hollywood by identical scores of 4 to 3. Last night, as the night before, a home run ended the agony. Dom Dallessandro, the little man who is the big shoulders, socked one out of the park in the first half of the 11th inning.

## Idaho Building Ring Rep Among Collegians

MOSCOW, Idaho, May 6 (AP)—The University of Idaho's flashy letters are building their alma mater a reputation as the college capital of the nation.

When Ted Kara, Idaho's fancy 120-pounder, whipped his opponent in the finals of the NCBA tournament in 1941, he became the first college ringman to win three national championships.

Six years later another three-time winner, Laune Erickson, the "Blugging Swede," came out of Idaho. He had won national titles in 1940 and 1941, and last year, after taking time out for the war, he came back to slug his way undefeated through the light heavyweight ranks.

Now another Idaho battler—Herb Carlson—promises to put together the first string of four national championships in college ring history.

As a freshman in 1947, Carlson won the 155-pound title. This year, fighting at 160 pounds, he walked off with another belt. And his coach, Ken Butler, predicts that he will defend his championship in 1949 and 1950.

Kara was a "dancing master" type of ringman who won most of his bouts on points. Carlson, like the slugger Erickson, goes out for blood.

He has never lost a college battle. Most of his victories have been knockouts, usually in the second round. He uses the first round to measure his opponent, then opens a two-fisted attack in the second.

Despite his ferocity in the ring, Carlson is a quiet, unassuming lad who is highly popular with his classmates. Recently, he was elected to the student governing board for a second year.

Kara began his three-year championship reign in 1929 in the 127-pound division. The next two years he fought at 120 pounds to make room on the Idaho squad for his brother, Frank, who fought at 127 pounds.

### Strong Retires After 15 Years Of Pro Football

NEW YORK (NEA)—Speaking of retiring after 25 years of top-notch football competition, Strong, who won all-America honors at New York university, is the professional New York Giants' all-time high scorer with 351 points. Strong names the 1934 championship play-off with the Chicago Bears as his biggest gridiron thrill. That was when the Polo Grounds came out in rubber-sole shoes for the second half and smacked the visitors, 30-13, to snap their unbeaten skein at 34. A promising baseball career by Strong was cut short when he injured his hand bumping into a fence while chasing a fly in the International league.

# Navy Oars Brush Up On Stroke

ANNAPOLIS, Md., May 6 (AP)—Navy's undefeated crew polished up its "college creek" stroke today for its first spring of the year on the Schuylkill river Saturday.

"It is problematical" whether the 1947 Poughkeepsie champions will be able to "gear downward" for the short 2000-meter race, said Coach C. S. (Buck) Walsh.

Navy and Cornell rank as the east's two major unbeaten shells and the midshipmen already have their sights set on the Olympic trials this summer. But Walsh is not happy over those sprits on the Schuylkill.

The midshipmen meet Harvard and the University of Pennsylvania at Philadelphia this week, then the cream of the east over the same short course on the Charles at Boston May 22.

### Youth Gets 3-Year Term

Leonard Thomas Powers, 20, was sentenced to three years in the Oregon state penitentiary Wednesday afternoon on a plea of guilty to forgery.

The youth admitted forging a fictitious name to several checks here during March and April, but contended in court that several other checks which he cashed were authorized by another man named Jack Mayfield.

A warrant of arrest is out for Mayfield but police believe he skipped about the time Powers was arrested last week.

Powers and John Welsh, 37, of Bly, are now scheduled for a trip to Salem and prison. Welsh was sentenced to five years Wednesday in circuit court when he pleaded guilty to passing bad checks. He has four previous convictions.

### 13 Adrift In Crippled Boat

SEATTLE, May 6 (AP)—Thirteen persons drifted with the ice today in the leaking fishing boat Tootie, 30 miles north of Fort Heiden, Alaska, the coast guard reported.

The distressed vessel's call, picked up by the cutter Bittersweet, said the ship was "taking some water aft."

The Bittersweet set out immediately from Cold Bay, near the tip of the Alaska peninsula. Port Heiden is midway up the west side of the peninsula. The coast guard said the cutter would reach the 119-foot Tootie about 10 p. m. (PST) tonight.

A B-17 and B-17 planes were to take off at dawn today from Kodiak and Fort Randle, weather permitting, the coast guard said.

The ship's radioed message said it became stuck in the ice last night while going from Port Moller to Nushagak. Its supply of fresh water also is running low, the message reported.

The coast guard could give no details as to identities of the 13 men aboard the vessel, nor the name of its owner.
