Boeing Sues Striking Union

SEATTLE, May 6 (AP)—The Boeing Airplane company filed suit in federal district court Wednesday against the striking Aeronautical Mechanics union, asking \$2,250,000 in strike damages.

Also named as defendant was the International Association of Machinists, parent body of the Independent Aero-Mechanics union, local 751.

The action accused the local and international with "causing and sanctioning" a strike of more than 14,500 members in Boeing's Seattle plants while a contract having a no-strike clause was in effect.

The union contended, when the strike was launched 14 days ago, the company had refused to bargain in good faith and the contract was void.

The company's complaint stated the damages would increase as the strike continued.

Lapham Takes China Job

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—Roger D. Lapham, former mayor of San Francisco and steamship company president, Wednesday was appointed chief of the special mission to China for the economic cooperation administration.

He will direct use of \$463,000,000 earmarked by congress for assistance to China under the foreign aid act signed a month ago.

Lapham, 64, completed a two-year term as mayor of San Francisco last January. He became president of the American-Hawaiian Steamship company in 1925 and was board chairman from 1938 to 1943.

The appointment was announced by ECA administrator Paul G. Hoffman, who is in charge of China aid as well as the European recovery program.

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—Government efforts to end the 51-day meat workers' strike broke off Wednesday without any sign of progress.

The federal mediation and conciliation service ended a series of negotiating sessions with the "big four" packing companies and the striking CIO Packing House Workers. Apparently there were no hopes in sight for a settlement of the dispute.

Dr. Merryman Dies At 69

opened here May 1, 1929. He was exceptionally proud of the hospital which he headed until it was sold two years ago. He continued to practice, however, and continued his activities until just recently.

In 1919, Dr. Merryman organized the Crater Lake Box company at Bray, Calif., and was its president and manager until it burned in 1928. That year he liquidated the business. He was a member of Klamath and Lake counties and the Oregon State Medical societies, a Fellow of the American Medical Association, and a Mason, Elk and Rotarian.

Born In Astoria
Dr. Merryman was born June 28, 1878, in Astoria, Ore., son of the late Captain John D. and Rebecca Ann Merryman, both pioneers of Hillsboro, Ore.

Attending schools in Hillsboro and Tualatin academy at Forest Grove, Dr. Merryman supplemented his education by attending the old Oregon Agricultural college, University of Oregon, and the University of Illinois where he received his degree in medicine in 1902. He did post graduate work in New York and Vienna, Austria, and began his professional career by working out of Portland. In 1902 he made two round trips to the orient as physician for the Portland Asiatic S. S. company.

Waiting Room Petition Out

Petitions are now being circulated through the rural areas favoring the establishment of a public waiting room for women in Klamath Falls.

When signed, the petitions will be presented to the city council and possibly the county court.

The project is being sponsored by the Associated Women of the Farm Bureau Federation, and has already received the support of the chamber of commerce directors.

Members of the organization point out that there is need for a central resting place, equipped with sanitary facilities, for women who come into Klamath Falls to shop. A survey made by the group showed the lack of such facilities in Klamath Falls.

Klamath Man's Death Learned

The body of a man found Saturday in the Siskiyou mountains four miles south of Ashland was definitely identified Wednesday as that of Peter James Burgoyne, 61, long time Klamath resident and mill worker.

Identification was made by Burgoyne's two sons, Louis and John of Portland. Death occurred about April 1, when Burgoyne is said to have gone to the remote spot and taken his life with a rifle. Matching pieces of the rifle were found in his personal effects in an Ashland hotel.

Burgoyne came here from Liberty Mount, with his family in 1921. For eight years he was night foreman for the old Shaw-Bertram operation, later being employed by Big Lakes Box company, the Boy Scout mill and the Oregon State highway department. Mrs. Burgoyne died here September 11, 1942. Burgoyne left here for Portland in 1943.

Final rites will be held Thursday at 10:30 a. m. from Littlefield chapel, Ashland, with burial in the valley.

No Parking Rule Asked

In co-operation with the Klamath Falls clean-up campaign, the police department asks that all car owners not park on Main street between 4th and the Balsiger building in the early morning hours.

At those hours, between 2 a. m. and 6 a. m., city street cleaners are at work and the usual heavy overnight parking on Main cuts the effectiveness of street cleaning in half.

The washers and sweepers can't get to the gutters, where most of the unsightly trash and dirt collects.

Cars persistently parked on Main during the clean-up hours can be tagged. Chief of Police Orville Hamilton said.
