O And C Timber Decision Due May 19

PORTLAND, May 6 (AP)—The interior department's decision on establishing a sustained yield timber cutting agreement with Fischer Lumber company on O & C re-vested lands is to be announced May 19 at Eugene.

secretary of the interior, will be in Eugene to announce the decision, the office here reported.

Establishment of the proposed sustained yield unit was the subject of hearings and a number of independent operators voiced opposition. In addition, a federal court suit was filed, aimed at blocking the unit. Opponents alleged it would create a monopoly and bar small operators from the timber.
