

Allemesch Slates Visit To Belgium

A long-awaited dream will come true this week-end when E. F. Allemesch of Chiloquin leaves on the first lap of a trip to his old home in Neleumunster, Belgium.

Highlight of the trip will be 73-year-old Allemesch's reunion with his 81-year-old brother at their childhood home. Allemesch is a retired farmer, and well-known in Lakeview where he farmed for many years after coming west from Nova Scotia.

He came to the United States in 1906, and has not since visited his native country. Allemesch plans to fly for as much of the trip as he can, leaving here by United Air Lines on the 7:55 flight Saturday evening. He will arrive in New York Sunday and leave the same after-

noon by Pan American for London, where he will land Tuesday morning.

From Dover, England, Allemesch will go by boat to Ostend, Belgium, and then to Neleumunster, just 11 miles away.

He will spend two months with his brother, and another month in Brussels, France, with other relatives. Then, sometime in July, he will return via Paris, London and New York by plane.

Plans for his visit were interrupted by the war, but now that they have materialized, Allemesch is as excited as a child and thrilled at the prospect of his first visit home after 42 years.

Child Drowns In Echo Canal

ECHO, Ore., May 6 (AP)—Five-year-old Charles Parks drowned in an irrigation canal here late Tuesday.

The child's body was recovered several miles north of Echo about two hours after he was missed by his mother. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Parks, moved here recently from Vale. They have two other children.

Condition Survey Of Airport Made

A general condition survey has been conducted at the municipal airport this week by W. C. Hill, airport engineer for the state board of aeronautics. Hill was in charge of the survey for the navy in order to bring naval records on the field up to date.

The last survey in 1945, since the airport has changed from its status as a naval air station when given to the city by the war assets administration.

Another section of property and buildings on the field went to the bureau of reclamation after the last survey. All changes as well as condition of buildings and facilities at the field will be reported in the survey, Hill said.

A second survey of the airport is in connection with the city's proposed zoning restriction to limit the height of structures and other ob-

stacles in a specified area surrounding the field.

The city has asked the state aeronautics board to make the survey in order to clarify both the engineering and legal angles of the ruling.

Results of the survey will be reported to city officials at a later date.

Hill left today upon completion of the condition survey and will go to Lakeview and other sections of Southern Oregon on business for the board before returning to his headquarters in Salem.
