### Sally Says No On Pay To Lawyer

SAN FRANCISCO, May 7 (AP)—An Oregon state senator who sued Sally Stanford for \$12,000 for legal services isn't going to collect if she can help it, the San Francisco night life figure said today.

Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland attorney and legislator, sued in federal court here yesterday. He said he obtained a pardon for Sally for an offense committed 27 1/2 years ago in Oregon.

"I never hired him. He did nothing for me and I'll pay him nothing," she protested.

"Two other senators on there did a lot more than he did, but it was Governor Snell (killed in an Oregon plane crash October 29) himself who gave me that pardon. He airmailed it directly to me.

"I was 17 when I made the mistake and was sent to prison. That was 27 1/2 years ago and it has been thrown up to me ever since."

She said the offense was obtaining goods under false pretenses and involved her purchase of an electric iron with a \$10 check given her by an admirer in Medford, Ore. The check proved worthless. She said she pleaded guilty and served 10 months of a two-year sentence.

Miss Stanford recalled she was introduced to Mahoney in Portland in 1946 by Jack Esterbrook, whom she described as a Portland Teamsters union official.

### Young Ranch Wife Thankful

The young ranch wife whose life was saved by emergency surgery in the Steel swamp ranch kitchen last March 25, made her first trip to Klamath Falls today since the sensational incident.

She is Mrs. Herman Vowell, 28, and she came to town to express her appreciation to the people who collaborated in the project that snatched her from tragedy at the lonely ranch southeast of Malin.

She told The Herald and News that she wants to thank the physicians who flew in to the ranch to perform the surgery: Pilot Bud Arnold who flew the plane; Bob Friesen, owner of the plane; the Klamath Air Search and Rescue unit, and all others who had any part in it.

"Everybody has been wonderful," said the young woman, her eyes filling with tears.

The attractive brown-eyed brunette was accompanied to Klamath by her husband, foreman of Bill Dalton's Steel swamp ranch. They were able to drive in a pickup truck, but it took three hours to cover the 30 miles from the ranch to Malin.

Mrs. Vowell's mother, Mrs. B. M. Torrins, Santa Cruz, Calif., left for her home today, after spending several weeks with her daughter at the ranch.

Mrs. Vowell was the center of wide public interest in late March when news of the ranchhouse surgery was carried on the wires. She became suddenly and dangerously ill at the ranch, which was inaccessible by road due to heavy snow. Dr. Jack Martin of Malin and Dr. Raymond Tice of Klamath Falls flew to the ranch and performed emergency surgery in the kitchen, using a dismantled kitchen door as operating table while Pilot Arnold administered the anesthetic.

### Four Found Shot To Death

CHESTER, S. C., May 7 (AP)—An 85-year-old mother and her three bachelor sons were found cut or shot to death in their home 16 miles east of Chester Thursday.

Coroner Lewis H. Miller listed the dead as:

Mrs. Margaret Howze, 85-year-old widow; R. T. Howze, 38; Lucius A. Howze, 58, and Ike Howze, 55.

Chief Ernest L. Bostick of Chester county's rural police said cursory examinations indicated murder and suicide.

G. H. Christopher, a plumber of Fort Lawn, told officers he discovered the four bodies in one room of the five-room rural dwelling. Christopher said he had gone to the residence of the widely-known farm family to repair a pump.

### Damage Suit Asks \$10,000

A damage suit for \$10,000 has been filed with the circuit clerk here by Charlie L. Boatman, 325 Commercial, growing out of an auto accident at the Lake Ewauna lookout point near the south city limits of town.

Defendant in the suit is Morgan Leslie Potter of San Francisco. The accident occurred the morning of February 23 when the highway was icy.

Boatman was injured in the accident, as was Mrs. Potter and two other persons. The suit contends that Boatman's hurts have been lasting and that the accident was caused by negligent driving and speeding on Potter's part.

U. S. Balentine, attorney, represents Boatman.

### Salary Cut Out—Hewitt Squeeze On

A proposed slash of \$100 a month in the salary of Ron Hewitt, county juvenile officer, was withdrawn Wednesday by the county budget committee, but a member of the county court said that Hewitt was expected to resign.

The salary item was replaced at \$4200 a year. About two weeks ago the budget committee knocked the figure for the next fiscal year down to \$3600 in a move definitely aimed at forcing a vacancy in the juvenile office.

If successful, the budget group's action would establish the power of the county court and its budget-makers to fire an appointee of the circuit court.

Appointed  
Hewitt was appointed by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg at a salary of \$4200 a year. Presumably any resignation would have to be presented to the judge.

Judge Vandenberg said that Hewitt had not resigned and that he had no knowledge of his juvenile officer's intentions. Hewitt himself was unavailable for comment.

Courthouse sources indicate, however, that a resignation was part of a "deal" which prompted the budget committee to restore the \$4200 figure. That much possible salary money would be necessary if another juvenile officer were hired.

In restoring the salary item in the juvenile office's budget, the committee did not replace a 50 per cent slash in a budget item for transportation. The request of the office was for \$1000 and it was cut to \$500.

Yesterday's budget meeting established the 1948-49 fiscal condition which will be published and readied for final hearing. Grand total of money to be raised by tax for Klamath county is \$717,501.81.

That total is within 55 cents of the amount the county can raise by taxes voluntarily.

Broken down, the proposed figures are \$419,064.68 for current expense of county government, \$284,029.13 for county payments to schools and \$14,408 for the county library.

The 1947-48 grand total of the county budget was \$678,889.02.

After legal publication twice, a public hearing on the budget is scheduled for June 9.

### Budget Unit Problem Up

The city will have to make another appointment on the budget committee. City councilmen appointed Russell Tisdale to the committee, and it was found at the first meeting Wednesday that Tisdale is ineligible because he lives outside the city limits.

A sixth appointive member will be named at next Monday's council meeting. The other two appointments made this week are Dick Maguire and Dr. C. J. Cox.

Elton Thompson was elected chairman by the group. The first session of the budget committee was devoted to a preliminary study of the city's financial status and needs. The second meeting will be next Wednesday.

Appointive members include Maguire, Thompson, Cox, Merle West and George McIntyre. The mayor and members of the city council are automatically members of the group.

### New Parking Rules Watched

City police will enforce temporary parking restrictions on Eldorado, Alameda and part of Main beginning Saturday.

Streets affected are those where traffic has been re-routed because of construction on the new north entrance highway through Esplanade.

There will be no parking from the underpass to the bridge on Main street on the left hand side going out.

No parking will be allowed on Alameda from the Old Fort road to Eldorado on the right hand side going out, and parking will be prohibited on both sides of the street in front of Hillside hospital. Eldorado from Alameda to Esplanade will have no parking on the right hand side going out.

Police Chief Orville Hamilton said that signs were being put up today. Restricted parking is necessary, Hamilton said, because heavy travel along the streets has caused a congested traffic condition.
