Rev. Tweet Takes Over At Lutheran

Rev. Irvin Tweet, formerly pastor of the Bethel Lutheran church, Brush Prairie, Wash., will be installed as pastor of the Klamath Lutheran church, Cross and Crescent, May 16 at 11 a. m. Dr. H. L. Foss, president of the Pacific district of the Evangelical Lutheran church of America, will officiate.

Rev. Tweet succeeds Pastor S. M. Topness, now of Huxley, Ia., who served the Klamath church from 1944 to 1948. Interim pastor has been Rev. H. J. Thorpe of Orland, Calif., who will conclude his three months ministry here this Sunday.

A graduate of St. Olaf college, Northfield, Minn., and Luther Theological seminary, St. Paul, Minn., Rev. Tweet comes to Klamath Falls after serving as pastor of the Brush Prairie church for three years. He is president for the Oregon circuit of the Evangelical Lutheran church.

Mrs. Tweet is a graduate of St. Olaf college school of music. She and their daughter, 20-month-old Sarah Ann, will accompany Rev. Tweet here.

On the call committee for the Klamath church were Mrs. Dave Liskey, Robert Ellingson Jr., L. K. Ellison, L. Ernest Taylor and J. B. Pebbler.

Rev. Thorpe, who is a retired pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran church, will move back to Orland where he and Mrs. Thorpe have their home, next week.

The theme for his last sermon this Sunday will be "Jesus, My Substitute," to be given at the 11 a. m. worship service. The senior choir, directed by Erling Melby, will sing "O Morn of Beauty" by Sibelius. Mrs. B. F. Wilkes will be at the organ. Sunday school and Bible classes are at 9:45 a. m. with the Young People's League meeting at 7:30 p. m., Sunday.
