She stressed the point that all women should be policy makers by building public opinion toward a constructive program. Women must study and be well informed in order to become better public officials, and other women must recognize and support such qualified women. Two necessary qualities for women with political careers are tolerance and the ability to receive criticism.

Mrs. Humphrey said all women must study and know the implications of our peace plans, and be willing to make the many sacrifices that their endurance demands. Urging that the United States stop apologizing for the things that seem wrong here, she believes this country should be more proud of all the things that are fundamentally right here. Mrs. Humphrey suggested thinking more of opportunity and a little less of security; that we do not put everybody in the same mold, but remember our country is proud that every race and creed has a contribution to make.

President Loraine Quillen welcomed members of visiting clubs which included the American Association of University Women, Sociologist club, Toastmistress club, League of Women Voters, and the Quota club.

During the business meeting which followed Mrs. Elaine Keens and Margaret Holliday told of the result of a survey they had conducted concerning the need of a public rest room in Klamath Falls. 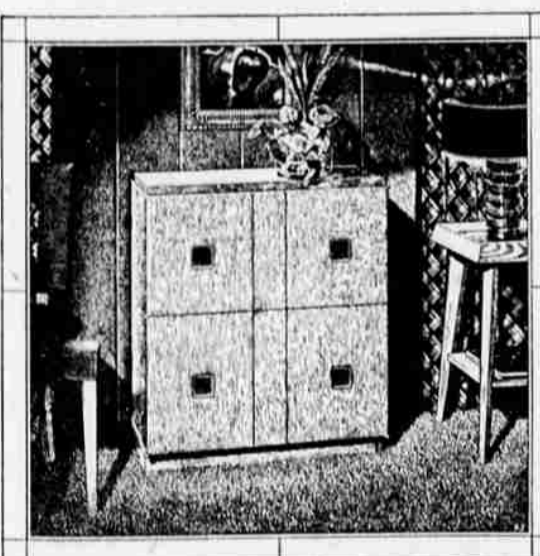
