

# Protection Promised By Boeing Plant

SEATTLE, May 10 (AP) — The Boeing Airplane company today promised "protection" to any of its 4,800 strike-idled workers who pass through picket lines to return to work.

"Work is available for those who apply," the company said. At the same time, company officials repeated their refusal to attend a federal conciliation service meeting set for today in Washington, D. C.

The decision to boycott the Washington meeting was based on the company contention that the 19-day-old work stoppage is illegal. The striking Aeronautical Mechanics' union (IAM) has lost its collective bargaining rights under the Taft-Hartley act, the company holds.

Cyrus Ching, conciliation service director, informed company officials Saturday that he is without authority to compel attendance at the session. He had invited representatives of the company and the International Association of Machinists (IAM), parent union of the Seattle local.

A Boeing spokesman denied that the company's "protection" pledge was designed as a back-to-work movement to "break the strike," as described by union officials. They said the statement was made in response to "many telephone calls and letters" from a great many individuals seeking information as to how they can return to work.

The strike was called in support of demands for wage increases of 30 cents an hour, eight paid holidays and retention of seniority clauses.

## Mother's Day Message Too Late

SEATTLE, May 10 (AP) — "You'll be hearing from me on Mother's Day," said a letter written by Mrs. Blanche Cunningham Powers, 28, to her mother in Sand Point, Idaho.

But the letter, dated April 29, was unmailed and the mother, Mrs. Edna Hillz, received a telephone call instead yesterday from courier's deputies. They informed her Mrs. Powers was found dead of gas poisoning in apartment.

## 800 Register At Crater On Sunday

Slightly over 800 visitors were at Crater Lake National park Sunday. Week-end skiing was good until Sunday afternoon when a hard icy crust began to form.

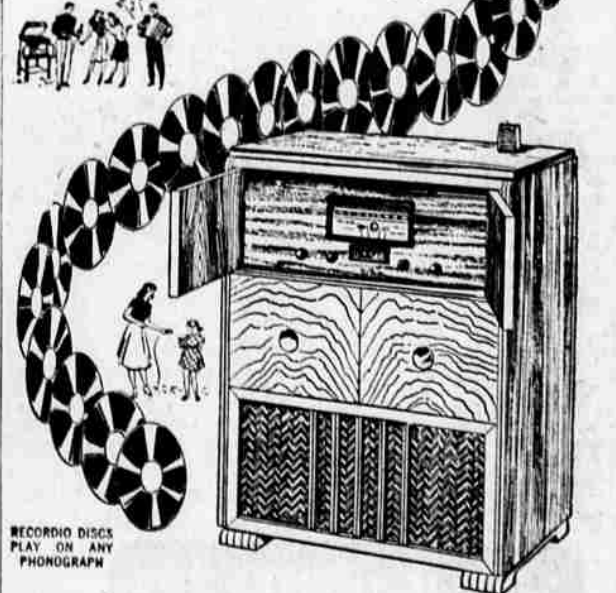
