

# Bad Weather Causes Up In Idle Roster

Unfavorable weather curtailed logging production and lumber operation as well as farm work in the Klamath area in April, the state employment office reported today. Many unemployed persons reported to the office that they have jobs and are just waiting for a break in the weather before going to work.

Unemployment in the area declined in April to 1485 actually seeking jobs. Of this number, 540 were veterans and 240 were females.

Employers reported workers sticking to their jobs. Reports from 76 firms showed separation rates of all employes 11.3 per cent two months ago and 6.1 per cent for April.

The employment office says that an increased demand for labor is starting, with construction, farming, logging and lumbering getting into full operation for the good weather period.

There is still a surplus of labor in the area, but there are a few shortages in skilled positions.

April saw an increase of job openings with a total of 266 jobs listed in the office and 24 left unfilled from the month before.

## Copco Employee Feared Drowned

GRANTS PASS, May 11 (AP)—Clarence Perry Kinzey, 30, local California Oregon Power company employe, is believed to have drowned while attempting to aid a distressed fishing companion on the Rogue at Hell's Hole late Saturday.

The companion, Russell White, said he was jerked out of the boat in which the pair were fishing, when he sought to steady it in rough water by snagging a willow with his fish line. As he was struggling to shore he saw Kinzey carried downstream. The boat did not upset and was recovered later with contents intact.

Boatmen and fishermen combed the river Sunday and today without locating a trace of the missing man.

## Kalinas, Polivkas Writing Home
