

# New Constitution Okayed For Girl Scout Work In Klamath; Officers Named

**Jet Runs Away From "Attackers"**

TACOMA, May 12 (AP)—A lone jet-propelled air force fighter plane effectively eluded nearly a dozen P-51 engine-powered Mustangs in a breathtaking mock aerial battle near here Monday.

The battle, apparently part of current war games embracing the entire Pacific coast, lasted for some 15 minutes over McChord air base at about 10,000 feet altitude.

# New York Bacteriologist Says He Can Make "Seeds" For Vaccine Against Polio

MINNEAPOLIS, May 12 (AP)—A New York bacteriologist said Tuesday science now has the means of developing good "seeds" for a vaccine against infantile paralysis—but lacks a proper "garden" in which to grow them.

Dr. Herald Cox of the Lederle laboratories division, American Cyanamid company, Pearl River, N. Y., said that a technique is in hand for purifying strains of infantile paralysis virus to the point where they could conceivably be used to produce a protective vaccine—but no satisfactory laboratory means has yet been found to grow the viruses in quantity.

He said monkeys offered the best bet to date for growing "polio" virus, but that the quantities produced were relatively small compared with those of influenza virus produced in fluids within a hatching hen's egg. So far, it has been impossible to grow polio virus in a hatching egg.

"Our solution to polio will come," he told a reporter, "when we can grow the polio virus in sufficient

quantity in animals other than the monkey—possibly in the chick embryo within the hatching egg."

(The principle of any vaccine is to inject either a dose of living, modified active virus or a dose of completely killed virus so that the body will build up resistance against a subsequent attack of the usual form of the disease.)

# Court Says Extra Milk Charge Out

SALEM, May 12 (AP)—The state supreme court said Tuesday that dairies can't be forced to charge an extra cent for milk sold in fiber cartons.

The high court declared invalid an order by State Agriculture Director E. L. Peterson ordering the extra charge be made.

Peterson has legislative authority to fix minimum prices for milk, but that authority does not include the order by Peterson on the fiber cartons.

The supreme court decision, by Justice James T. Brand, upheld Circuit Judge George R. Duncan of Marion county. It suggested that if Peterson wants authority to issue such an order, he can ask the legislature to give the power to him.

The decision also said that if a dairy wants to charge more for milk sold in fiber cartons, then it can do so.

The suit was brought by the Sunshine dairy of Portland against Peterson and eight other dairies.

In another case, the court ruled that Dr. Fred Jeannet, Portland chiropractor, must go to prison for three years for manslaughter. Dr. Jeannet was convicted in Port-

# Hospital To Get Addition

SALEM, May 12 (AP)—The state board of control Tuesday asked Leslie Howell, Portland architect, to prepare plans for a proposed \$200,000 addition to the Eastern Oregon State hospital at Pendleton.

The addition, to house 48 persons, was requested today by Dr. Donald Wair, superintendent of the hospital.

William Ryan, supervisor of state institutions, told the board the addition would do a lot toward housing the hospital employes, but that it would not entirely solve the problem.

State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott, one of the three board members, suggested that state properties be given better protection through the state restoration fund.

The restoration fund is the state's self-insurance system on its own property. It is financed by a levy of \$100,000 a year on state departments.

Scott recommended that the fund be doubled to \$200,000 a year.

# Timber Yield Decision Set

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—The interior department will announce next month a decision on a proposed management program for public and private forest lands in Western Oregon.

The decision will determine whether a Mohawk river unit will be established for sustained yield forest management. Such a unit, if established, would regulate cutting in accordance with growth to prevent forest depletion.

C. Girard Davidson, assistant secretary of the interior, said he will come to Oregon early in June to make the announcement.
