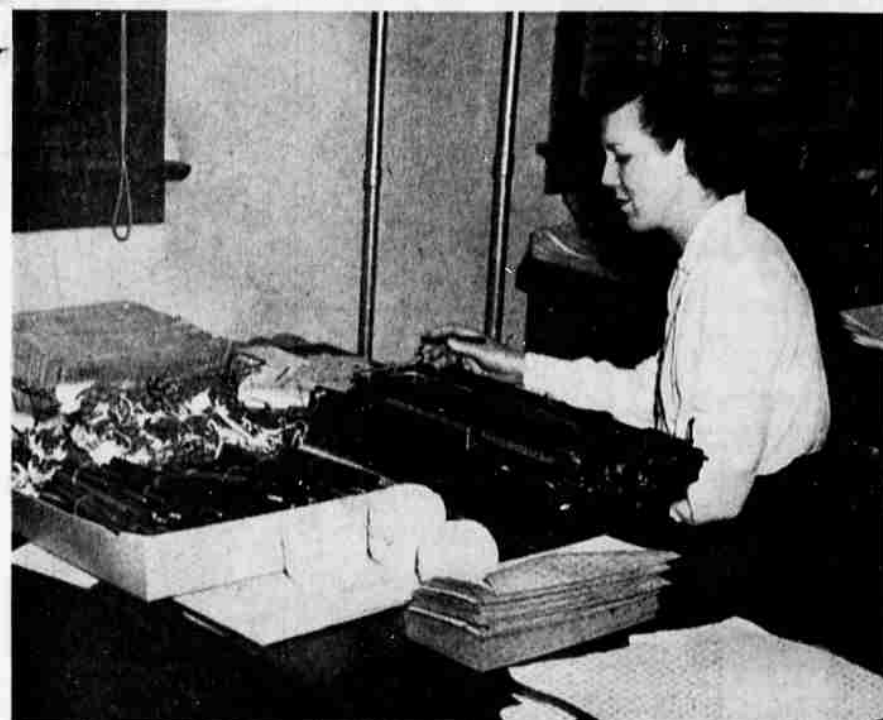

Portland Free Of Flood Danger

PORTLAND, May 12 (AP)—The Columbia river's peak spring run-off this month, although greater than expected earlier, will not cause serious damage in the Portland area, Elmer Fisher, weather bureau river forecaster, said Monday.

The crest at Vancouver will be about 20.5 feet—5.5 over flood stage—and will flood pasture lands below the city. At Portland, the Columbia's peak will back up the Willamette river to a crest of 19.5 feet, 1.5 above flood stage but not high enough for material damage, he said.

Stockhandlers OK New Contracts

CHICAGO, May 12 (AP)—A threatened strike of 400 CIO stockhandlers at the world's largest stockyards in Chicago was averted Monday night, four hours before the 12:01 a.m. strike deadline.

Frank Monaghan, president of local 44 CIO stockhandlers' union, which claims 400 members, said the union had accepted a new contract which provides for a wage increase of six cents an hour.

Monaghan said the pay raises were retroactive to last April 4.

"How Much Will I Get?" Most Frequent Question About Old-Age Insurance

"How much will I get?" is the question most frequently asked in regard to old-age and survivors insurance according to John Richardson, manager of the local social security office.

The answer, according to Richardson, depends on the individual's age and his average pay. "I will be glad to discuss this question with anyone who will get in touch with me either in person or by mail," he said. Each individual should know what protection social security is providing for him personally. This information is important in planning an insurance program, family budget, or savings plan.

The following are frequently asked questions regarding social security with answers provided by Richardson.

QUESTION: My husband was receiving an old-age benefit of \$44 per month at the time of his death. When I am 65 what will I receive?

ANSWER: You will receive \$33 per month, provided you do not remarry.

QUESTION: Does service in the armed forces count towards old-age and survivors insurance benefits?

ANSWER: Service in the armed forces is not covered work, however, an amendment to the law provides special protection to the families of World War II veterans for three years after discharge.

QUESTION: Will my benefit checks start coming automatically when I am 65?

ANSWER: No. You must file a claim. Wherever you may be at that time, you will find a social security administration field office in one of the larger towns nearby. That office will assist you in filing your claim.

QUESTION: What is the average amount being paid at the present time?

ANSWER: The average is running just about \$25 per month for the single retired person and \$36.50 for a couple over 65. On the average a widow with two young children is receiving approximately \$43.75.

QUESTION: What is the smallest and largest amount any one can draw?

ANSWER: The minimum payable is \$10 per month, the maximum is \$85.

QUESTION: Is Uncle Sam going to have the money to pay off with when I'm 65?

ANSWER: No. You must file a claim. Wherever you may be at that time, you will find a social security administration field office in one of the larger towns nearby. That office will assist you in filing your claim.

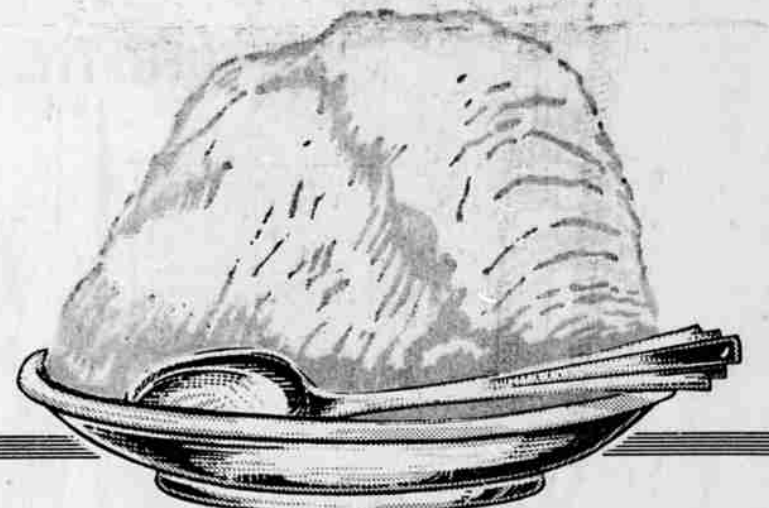
