Because of the coming convention, the next meeting will be postponed until May 25. Mrs. M. W. Simpson of 2135 White will entertain.

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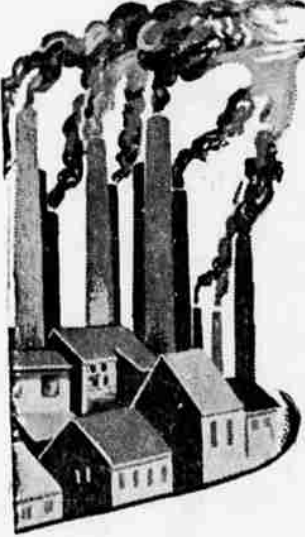
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
