Walker Is Speaker At CC Meeting

State Senator Dean Walker warned against loose talk about the so-called "income tax surplus" of the state of Oregon in an address on state fiscal affairs given to the annual meeting of the Klamath County chamber of commerce at the Willard Hotel Monday night.

Walker said use of the term "surplus" in reference to the income tax reserves is unfortunate, and he charged that there has been a lot of demagoguery in public discussions of this fund.

The senator said that it would be unwise to authorize new places for spending of the income tax reserves—which some say will go to \$50,000,000 in another year—until it is known exactly how much money is available after all of the present requirements against the income tax are met and a total study is made.

He said that the so-called surplus would not be in existence now if the present laws on distribution of the income tax had been in effect over a period of years.

School Law
(The recently enacted basic school law, for instance, now heavily taps state income tax money.)

The speaker, who has served many terms as chairman of the senate ways and means committee, emphasized that the income tax is definitely and exclusively a property tax reduction measure. It was passed, he said, after nine tries as just such a measure and under such a title. He pointed out that if income tax revenues are not available in sufficient volume, the state will have to come back on the counties for property tax money, something which it has not done for many years.

Income tax revenues, Walker said, could be cut by a change in the law shifting corporate excise taxes to the general fund from the income tax fund, and by raising the exemptions on income taxes. With school and other costs rising, and the economic future uncertain, the income tax backlog is a favorable factor in Oregon's state financial picture and should be handled with the greatest care, Walker said.

Walker was introduced by State Representative Henry Semon who, as chairman and member of the house ways and means committee, has worked with Walker many years on state financial matters.

The members of the chamber at the meeting last night adopted a by-law designed to force "new blood" into the membership of the board of directors.
Under this ruling, no director may serve more than two consecutive terms (four years). After serving two years, a director becomes ineligible for reelection until he has been off the board for at least one year.

The old rule was that directors could serve only three consecutive terms.
Phil Hitchcock, 1947-48 chamber president, opened last night's meeting and turned the gavel over to Al Hattan, the new president.

Einaudi To Head Italian Government

ROME, May 12 (AP)—Vice Premier Luigi Einaudi, 74-year-old banker-economist, was elected first president of the new Italian Republic Tuesday night.

Even before the count on the fourth ballot was completed, Einaudi had the required majority of the 900 votes of both houses of parliament.

With about 200 votes still to be tallied, he had received 451.
Einaudi, 74, backed by the dominant Christian democratic party, is a political independent. He is budget minister and governor of the Bank of Italy.

On the third ballot of a joint session of the senate and chamber of deputies, Einaudi received 462 votes. This was far short of the two-thirds margin required for election on any of the first three ballots. However, the constitution provides that if the first three ballots are unsuccessful a simple majority rules on the fourth. The Christian democratic support gave Einaudi more than a simple majority of the 900 votes of the two houses.

Foreign Minister Carlo Sforza, foe of the communists, withdrew from the race last night after a day of pickering and two unsuccessful ballots.

Einaudi is an economist, politician, teacher and journalist. He taught finance at the University of Turin. He became governor of the Bank of Italy in 1944.

Long Takes Office Again

BATON ROUGE, La., May 11 (AP)—Earl Kemp Long returned to political power in Louisiana Tuesday with his inauguration as governor.

The capital was in holiday attire for the ceremonies which climaxed an eight-year-old struggle by the brother of the late Sen. Huey Long to regain the state's highest office. Preparations were made for 100,000 guests at the inaugural festivities. To fulfill one of Long's campaign promises, the menu provided 200,000 hot dogs, 240,000 bottles of pink soda pop and 16,000 containers of buttermilk.

As a symbol of Long's return to the governorship which he held in 1930-40 following the resignation of Gov. Richard Leche at the outbreak of the Louisiana scandals, a light flicked on last night from the skyscraper steeple here. The beam picked out the statue of Huey Long standing in the capitol park.

Employment Staff Here Adds 4 Men

Four new men have accepted positions with the Klamath Falls office of the state employment service, 3rd and Main. O. E. Thompson, OSES area supervisor, announced Tuesday.

C. F. Friedel, formerly of Medford, is field examiner for the unemployment compensation commission, with headquarters at the employment service office. Formerly, he was connected with a farm implement company in Medford. His duties are particularly concerned with collection of contributions for unemployment compensation. Any employers having questions on the unemployment compensation act are urged to contact him, telephone 7701.

Other new men are W. C. Hurn, George Benedict and Julius D. Giuntioni.

Hurn was transferred to the employment service from the state highway department. He is in charge of the sawmill and logging workers placement for the service.

Benedict was transferred from Coos Bay to the local office to take over placement of farm workers. A job in the employment service has not been handled since 1942.

Benedict is well acquainted with farm labor problems and grew up on a farm near Oregon City. His wife will join him here soon.
Giuntioni has taken a position with the claims department of the OSES. Before the war he was connected with the foreign languages department of the University of Oregon, and later served as an interpreter for prisoner of war camps and Mexican national labor camps.

Pittsburgh Firm Is Low Bidder

A low bid of \$98,538 was submitted Tuesday on the Poe valley channel improvement planned by the Klamath district of the reclamation bureau.

The offer was made by M. Matitano and Sons, 415 Industrial road, Pittsburg, Calif. Marshall and Haas, San Mateo, bid \$109,875, and W. W. Brown, Redding, offered to do the job for \$118,520.

Twelve bids were received. The result of the bidding was sent to the Denver engineering office for final action. Work is expected to start in four to six weeks.

Ashley Takes Clerkship Of Boards 1-2

A controversy between the Klamath county school board and Superintendent Harold B. Ashley appeared settled Tuesday when it was made known that Ashley has accepted the clerkship of Boards 1 and 2, Klamath Falls.

Announcement of Ashley's appointment was made known by Superintendent of City Schools Arnold Grattap, following Ashley's election by the boards last night.

Ashley takes over his new duties July 1. He replaces W. A. Heston, resigned.

Got Ruling

The county superintendent was advised last March 22 that his services were no longer required in that capacity. Ashley, however, got a ruling from the attorney general that he should have been advised by the deadline of March 15, of the board. Therefore, the attorney general ruled, he could claim a year's pay on the superintendent's basis.

Ashley's position remained somewhat involved today but everything seems satisfactory all the way around. Ashley leaves the county school office on June 1. Carrol B. Howe, a supervisor of secondary education in the state superintendent's office and former principal of Henry high school, takes over on that date.

Senate Group Okays Draft Proposal

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—The senate armed services committee Tuesday approved a draft of men 19 to 25 for the armed services. The legislation also provides for training 161,000 18-year-old volunteers.

Southern senators tried to get in a race segregation amendment, but the committee voted it down.

Offered by Senator Russell (D-Ga.), it proposed to give every enlisted man in the army, navy, marines and air forces the right to ask service only in a unit "of his own race."

Chairman Gurney (R-S.D.) said the vote rejecting the Russell amendment was 7-4, as follows: For it—Russell, Byrd (D-Va.), Hill (D-Ala.), Maybank (D-S.C.); against segregation—Gurney, Robertson (R-Wyo.), Wilson (R-Iowa), Saltonstall (R-Mass.), Morse (R-Ore.), Baldwin (R-Conn.) and Tydings, (D-Md.)

The action means the matter of segregation is left up to the department of defense.

With this out of the way the committee voted 7-2 to send the bill to the senate. For the bill: Gurney, Bridges (R-N.H.), Robertson, Saltonstall, Morse, Baldwin and Tydings.

Against the bill—Wilson and Russell.

Voting present only—Byrd, Hill and Maybank.

Local Trains On Schedule

The railroad strike—which didn't materialize—caused very little difficulty with the two principal lines here, officials report, but a few cars of perishable goods were sidetracked to ice docks late yesterday just in case the work stoppage went through.

When the strike was called off, two local union leaders were up most of the night contacting workers and telling them to come to work at their regular hours.

E. S. Shelley, Brotherhood of Railroad Engineers, and Clyde Meade, Brotherhood of Railroad Engine-men and Firemen, managed to get the official word to all employes and both Southern Pacific and Great Northern trains went out on schedule.

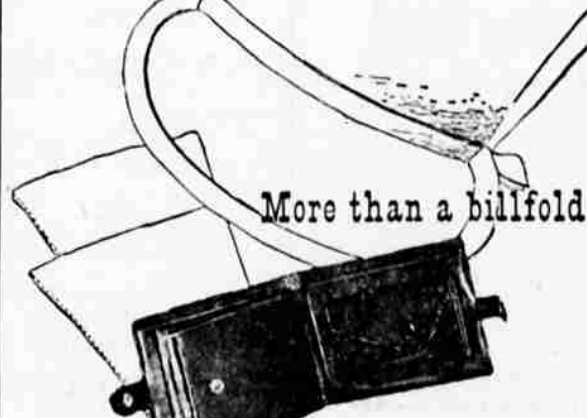
