

# Jews Call On All Trained Men, Women To Stand By As Mandate End Impends

JERUSALEM, May 13 (AP)—Jewish forces called upon all trained men and women of fighting age to mobilize for the "zero hour" in Palestine when a Jewish state is proclaimed.

The state will be proclaimed early tomorrow night, effective one minute after midnight, when the British mandate ends. The Jewish provisional government decided in Tel Aviv to proclaim the state early in the evening to avoid such action on the Jewish Sabbath.

The Jewish mobilization call, issued in Haifa, ordered all men and women between the ages of 18 and 35 who have had any previous military training to report immediately for duty. These include not only those who have had training in Jewish forces, but also those who had any type of previous training.

Observers said this was a precaution against possible invasion by the neighboring Arab countries. Egypt has imposed a state of siege to prepare for possible Holy Land action. Syria and Lebanon are clamping down martial law when the mandate ends Friday midnight.

At the same time the seven-nation Arab league prepared to set up what it called an Arab civil administration, as distinguished from a state, to function in cooperation with occupying Arab forces.

Haifa is the Jewish army, planned to take over all-Arab Jaffa, which adjoins Tel Aviv. Jaffa's Arab emergency committee, set up when the port city's municipal government collapsed last week following Jewish attacks, surrendered Jaffa at 11 a. m. in Tel Aviv, accepting all Jewish terms.

In Cairo, Egypt's cabinet members approved a draft of a royal decree proclaiming martial law for Egypt as a means of supporting possible Egyptian military moves in support of the Palestine Arabs. The decree provides for appointment of Premier Mahmoud Fahmy Nokrashi Pasha as military governor. The interior ministry said the king would sign it in a matter of hours.

A five-man committee in Tel Aviv prepared a draft of the declaration proclaiming the Jewish state.

For the first time in almost 2000 years this Sabbath Friday, candles of the Holy Land Jewry will burn on the soil of a Jewish state, a member of the provisional government said.

McKay, Hall Slate Debate

PORTLAND, May 13 (AP)—State Senator Douglas McKay of Marion county and Governor John H. Hall will debate the issue of sale of school lands.

McKay issued the challenge yesterday and the governor was quick to accept. Both are candidates for the republican gubernatorial nomination.

McKay's headquarters announced the topic will be "Shall Oregon's School Lands Be Sold or Leased?" A date has not been set.

The senator earlier this week protested sale of a parcel of Coos Bay tidelands to a lumber company. The firm plans a \$100,000 dock on the site. McKay said the sale reverses a long standing land board policy of leasing school land instead of selling. He added that this opens the door to "looting of the state's irrevocable school fund trusts."

Gov. Hall yesterday explained that the state gains by the sale. He said the \$250 a year lease rent would more than be made up by taxes from the improvement and real estate taxes. Furthermore, Hall said, the dock provides for community development and jobs.

## HST Farm Message Set For Friday

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—President Truman said today he hopes to send a farm program message to congress tomorrow.

He told his weekly news conference, however, that he is not ready to announce the appointment of a new secretary of agriculture. He'll do that, he added as soon as he gets the man.

Clinton Anderson resigned Monday as secretary to run for the senate in New Mexico with the president's blessing.

Mr. Truman gave no indication what he will propose in tomorrow's message, regarded as a bid for the farmers' vote.

The Republican-controlled senate agriculture committee got the jump on Mr. Truman yesterday by laying down a long-range farm plan, calling for a revised price support program.

Democratic leaders had indicated earlier this week they would seek to win the farm ballot by plugging the theme that the Republican congress would take no action this year on a permanent farm program.

But the committee not only beat Mr. Truman to the punch but sponsors said the bill closely follows recommendations laid down by the agriculture department. Senator Aiken (R-Vt.) principal author of the new measure, predicted congressional approval without any major changes.

Sliding Scale  
The bill provides for a sliding scale of price supports for agricultural commodities which now are being maintained at 90 per cent of parity. When the crops provide a normal supply the price supports would be pegged at 75 per cent of parity.

When the supply of any farm commodity varied from 70 to 130 per cent of normal, the supports would range from 90 down to 60 per cent of parity.

The committee revised the parity formula—the system of figuring prices designed to be equally fair to the farmer and those who buy his produce—by adding a "modernization" clause.

This keeps the 1909-1911 base period currently used but provides for adjustments to the price relationships of the most recent 10 years. That would mean that the parity price of most field crops would come down.

**BUBBLE RING**  
1 cake compressed Yeast  
1/2 cup lukewarm Water  
1 cup Milk  
5 Tablespoons Shortening  
5 Tablespoons Sugar  
2 teaspoons Salt  
3-4 cups Fisher's Blend Flour

Crumble yeast and soak in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add shortening, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add yeast and water. Sift and measure Fisher's Blend Flour. Add flour gradually, beating until smooth. Turn dough onto a lightly floured board. Knead well. Place in bowl. Cover top lightly. Let rise until half again its original size. Bake at 400° F. 25 to 30 minutes. Serves 8 to 10.
