## Bob Doerr Homers For 6-5 Sox Edge Over Chicago Club

Connie Mack's collection of draftees and hand-me-downs in showing up the rich major league clubs with a 10-game win streak, the Philadelphia A's are upholding the old theory that you can't buy a pennant.

While Tom Yawkey of the Boston Red Sox was writing checks for some \$350,000, Mr. Mack was busy scanning the draft lists. By the studious avoidance of any large outlay of cash, the venerable old gentleman has acquired quite a ball club.

And they've been winning quite handsomely, too, although they did have to struggle to achieve an 8-4 victory over the St. Louis Browns last night. Three hits and four walks added up to six runs for Philadelphia in the second inning, to the delight of the crowd of 21,763.

Dick Fowler, the starter, faded in the seventh and Mack had to follow reliever Bob Savage with Lou Brissie who worked two hitless innings.

The A's thumped loser Cliff Fanning and five successors for 10 hits.

**PIRATES SULLIED**  
Rain washed out the Yankee stadium meeting of Cleveland and New York with the Yanks leading 3-1 in the home half of the fourth.

The postponement nullified a three-run homer by Joe DiMaggio off Gene Bearden in the first inning.

Detroit staged two big innings to down Washington, 14-9, although Hal Newhouser was knocked from the box for the fourth straight time.

Dizzy Trout, third of four pitchers, notched the win over reliever Martino Pioretti.

Sherry Robertson, Washington right fielder, wrenched a knee severely when he slipped while chasing a fly in the eighth.

Bobby Doerr's three-run homer in the 10th inning enabled Boston to grab a 6-5 win from Chicago in dramatic fashion. Cot Deal, who pitched to only two batters, picked up his first major league win at the expense of Earl Harbert.

Rain idled half the National League the New York at St. Louis and Boston at Chicago games. However, the Pittsburgh Pirates were able to get in a game with the Phillies which dropped them a half game back of the Cardinals.

**PIRATES BLANKED**  
Bliz Donnelly of the Phils handed the Pirates their first shutout of the year, 5-0, allowing only three hits. He was in control all the way with the help of Johnny Blatnik, the rookie outfielder, who had a perfect four-hit day. Ernie Bonham was the loser.

Hank Sauer unloaded his seventh homer, a three-run blast in the last of the ninth, but it wasn't enough. His Cincinnati Reds bowed to Brooklyn, 9-7, in a night game.

Joe Hatten, the first of four Dodger pitchers, was the winner over Johnny Vander Meer, but Leo Duracher had to whistle to the bullpen for Hugh Casey to end it in the ninth.

SOMERVILLE, Mass., May 13 (AP)—Three years ago Robert W. Osgood was told he had less than three years to live and to give up playing his favorite game—baseball.

However, Somerville high school faculty manager Robert Buckley said, Bob didn't think he'd live anyway and wanted to continue playing ball.

At first Bob was turned down for the school team. But he went on to become one of the greatest catchers in the school's history and was chosen on several Massachusetts all-scholastic teams.

After graduating last year, Bob signed with the Chicago Cubs and was assigned to a Fayetteville, N. C., club.

This year he was promoted to the Chicago farm in the Ohio-Indiana league, the Marion, O. Cubs.

He reported last Sunday after recovering from an attack of influenza.

Tuesday night he was sitting on the bench during a rainstorm which forced postponement of a game at Richmond, Ind.

Bob suddenly slumped over. An hour later the 19-year-old catcher was pronounced dead of a heart attack.

A spotlight centers at the top of an aisle leading to the ring, all eyes follow it, and that's when wrestling's newest actor, Gorgeous George, makes his grand appearance.

He has a heavy mop of carefully marcelled, honey-hued locks, the result of regular and well advertised trips to one of Hollywood's most prominent beauty shops.

He wears one of a collection of 88 padded, quilted, brocaded or sequin dressing gowns of brilliant shades in silk, satin, velvet or fur-trimmed cloth. The roar of boos and catcalls increases in volume as he steps majestically down the aisle.

# Tornado Runners Favored

Having already won every track and field meet entered this spring, the Medford high school Black Tornado is being touted to do more of the same this week-end at Corvallis and win the state prep school track championships.

Medford won the Hayward relays earlier in the year, also the Southern Oregon-Northern California competition here in Klamath Falls, plus a variety of two-team dashes and the district meet.

In all, 10 members of the Tornado squad are qualified for the state meet, in seven or eight events. Klamath Falls, meanwhile, has only six boys qualified for Corvallis showing and only in three events. John Stone, captain of the Pels, will run the high hurdles, Bill Mosby the low hurdles, and the quartet composed of Jerry Schubert, Tom Edwards, Pat Baker and Doug Barker the 880-yard relay.

At best the Pels can capture only 15 points, if the usual procedure of awarding points on the 5-4-3-2-1 basis for first, second, etc. is followed.

Only one track event remains on the Pel agenda after this week-end, a newly-instituted Southern Oregon vs. Portland meet to be held Friday, May 21, at Medford. That finale will be a night show.
