## CC Directors Hear Report On Survey

Progress on the current economic survey of Klamath county was reported to the chamber of commerce directors yesterday by Jim Campbell of Hahn, Campbell and associates, the firm making the study. Campbell showed the directors the base maps of the city and county on which many kinds of information will be shown in the completed study. Spot maps for accidents, maps showing property ownership, a county map showing federal ownership of a large portion of the land, and many others were displayed by Campbell.

He said the survey has reached the point where his firm is beginning to fit together a vast volume of information gathered in the early stages. He discussed with the directors what may be done about making copies of the survey available to the public after it is finished.
