Terminal Island Site Sinking

LOS ANGELES, May 13 (AP)—Terminal Island, site of extensive navy installations, is sinking at the rate of 10 inches a year and harbor officials said today the condition is causing grave concern.

Arthur Eldridge, harbor department manager, said the Badger avenue bridge which crosses Cerritos channel, has settled five feet since it was built. Abutments of the bridge, connecting the island with the mainland, must be raised seven feet. Bids for the work have been advertised.

Youth Found Shot To Death In Room

CORVALLIS, May 13 (AP)—A pre-medical school student at Oregon State College was found dying in his room Tuesday, a .32 caliber rifle beside him. He died in a hospital.

The sophomore student, F. W. McKenzie, 19, was the son of Dr. Fred P. McKenzie, chairman of the college's animal husbandry department.

Police said they were called to break down the door to the student's room when Norman Thompson, a friend, reported it locked when he tried to enter for a visit.

FARM PRICE UP

During the year ended March 1 this year, the average price of farm land rose 7 per cent nationally, the USDA reports. That was a slower rate than the year before when the average price of farm land went up 12 per cent. Three states—California, Florida and Louisiana—registered lower farm land prices last year. These decreases, however, were more than offset by increases, especially in wheat and range-live-stock areas.
