Suit Filed To Recover Missing Fund

Dean Johnson, 26-year-old former bookkeeper for the Klamath Concrete Pipe company who is awaiting a hearing on a criminal charge of larceny, Thursday was named defendant in a lawsuit for recovery of \$12,000 which he allegedly misappropriated over an 18-month period as employee of the company.

The suit charges that Johnson received and did not account for more than \$12,000 in company funds between July, 1946, and February, 1948.

The man was arrested in March after the pipe company changed hands and Johnson left his job to go to Portland. Last December 7 the office of the company was wrecked by a still-unexplained explosion. Johnson had been at the office shortly before the explosion early that Sunday morning.

The blast, however, did not destroy bookkeeping records and it was those records which brought about Johnson's arrest on the larceny charge. On that count he is accused of stealing \$76.97 from the company by making out duplicate pay checks.

A preliminary hearing is due in justice court on the larceny charge, but Justice of the Peace J. A. Mahoney said that no date had been set. He said that he would try to have the hearing early next week.

Johnson is free on \$1500 cash bail and has retained Attorney E. E. Driscoll to represent him.

The law firm of Farrens and Maxwell is representing the company in the lawsuit.

Dewey, McKay Win Ballot

Gov. Thomas Dewey and Sen. Douglas McKay won in straw balloting on the GOP presidential and governorship nominations at Thursday noon's meeting of the Kiwanis club.

Wind Injures Basin Grain

By WALT JENDRZEJEWSKI Assistant County Agent Red-eyed farmers on the lighter soils in the south end of the county are ruefully surveying filled up ditches and fence rows and cut off grain after Wednesday's windstorm and considering management practices which offer a solution to wind erosion.

Considerable discussion of the value of maintaining a high level of organic matter in sandy soils to keep them from blowing could be heard yesterday. Strong winds such as occurred Wednesday are likely to move any light soil that is open.

Better wind erosion control is obtained by cover cropping. Good results obtained with fall seeded Utah winter barley indicate that crop as a substitute for spring seeded grains.

Humus disappears more rapidly from sandy soils than from heavier soils. More regular return of organic matter is required.

Negro Held For Theft

John Peak, 20-year-old negro transient from Columbus, O., is spending three days in the county jail for petty theft and is due for a floater out of town when released from the hoosegow.

Peak was arrested Wednesday afternoon by city police after he admitted to stealing a blanket out of a car owned by Delmer Lee, 1835 Johnson. The blanket was recovered and Peak was located at the Southern Pacific ice dock.

Reds Assail Proposal In Holy Land

LAKE SUCCESS, May 14 (AP)—The new American plan for appointment of a United Nations commission for Palestine was described by Russia Thursday as a road to war.

Russia joined in the attack after the Jewish agency had blasted the U. S. proposal as an attempt to set aside the U. N. assembly's decision of November 29, 1947, to partition the Holy Land.

Evans, who is presiding clerk of the Philadelphia yearly meeting of the Society of Friends, previously had been accepted by both Jews and Arabs for the appointment as mayor, or municipal commissioner, the name used officially in the UN Plan III.

Poland and Guatemala, both strong for partition, also assailed the U. S. plan.

The Jewish agency's position was set forth in a statement by the agency's spokesman outside a secret meeting of a 12-nation subcommittee of the special Palestine assembly.

Arab representatives, although making no public statement, were understood to find serious fault with several provisions of the American proposal. They said they still were awaiting instructions from home.

Stassen In For Busy Day In Klamath

Harold Stassen, republican presidential aspirant, will be here tonight and all indications point to a busy schedule of speechmaking and handshaking.

The Minnesota will fly into Klamath Falls from Ontario, arriving here about 6:15 p. m. Friday. His party includes about 30 persons and uses two chartered planes.

WTC To Open Longview Mill Again

LONGVIEW, May 14 (AP)—The Weyerhaeuser Timber company Thursday announced plans to reopen all departments of the Longview operations Monday morning. The decision to resume production came in the face of the continuing strike of the CIO boommen and rafters that began April 13.

Company officials gave formal notice of their decision to officials of the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) and the boommen and rafter's union locals.

The boommen were also advised by the company that the recently authorized 12 1/2 cents an hour wage increase for the lumber industry would apply to Weyerhaeuser boom workers.

Union officials, contacted after the announcement was made, declined to comment.

Elmer Beach, president, and Tris Peterson, secretary of the IWA local, said the matter "probably would be discussed at a meeting scheduled for Saturday."

J. A. Coney, business agent for the boommen's local, said a meeting will be called by his organization to discuss the attitude following the conference.

Sheriff Bond May Go Up

A recommendation to raise the bond requirements of the sheriff of Klamath county is being studied by the county court, Judge U. E. Reeder said Thursday. The county budget committee has suggested that the total bond be upped from \$50,000 to \$65,000.

The present bond requirement is \$15,000 in the sheriff's capacity as sheriff and \$50,000 in his capacity as tax collector. The latter amount would be boosted to \$50,000.

The bond requirement was set 24 years ago when Lloyd Low became sheriff and has never been changed despite the fact that in recent years the tax office handles about three times as much money as it did in the late 20's.
