

# Jewish State Of Israel Proclaimed

## Russia Throws Weight Around In Korea, Cuts Off Power To US Controlled Zone

The new Jewish state of Israel, with the biggest active army in the Middle East, was proclaimed today in Tel Aviv (at 6 a. m. Pacific standard time).

The Arab league secretariat proclaimed in Damascus last night a state of war between the Arab countries and Palestine Jews.

Fighting raged in half a dozen places in Palestine but still there was no definite indication of a full fledged Arab invasion.

The British struck their colors over government house in Jerusalem. Gen. Sir Alan Cunningham, the high commissioner, left Palestine and went aboard the cruiser Euryalus at Haifa. The British mandate

ends at midnight (2 p.m. PST). The United Nations still talked of ways to keep the peace in Palestine.

**Power Off**

Russia tossed her weight around in Korea, Berlin, Greece. President Truman asked \$2,434,441,000 more for defense to expand the U. S. total for the year above 14 billions. The house received a bill to crimp the communist party in the U. S.

North Korea, occupied by Russia, cut off power to the U. S. zone in South Korea, where anti-communist scored a smashing week-end election triumph. The North Koreans talked of an old bill for power; the U. S. moved two navy power barges into the breach. An officer at Gen. MacArthur's headquarters accused the Russians of breaking an agreement to send 50,000 Japanese home each month.

Russians walked out of the public safety committee of the four-power rule of Berlin. Western authorities said the Russian military administration in Germany is undergoing a purge. The Soviets placed new barriers on interzonal traffic.

Pravda of Moscow accused U. S. foreign policy makers of a retreat after seeking to soothe U. S. public

opinion by suggesting conciliation talks. Tass said Russia had protested to Greece against the execution of rebels and declared these must stop. Greece has identified the condemned as convicted murderers.

If the Arabs were to invade Palestine, warrior King Abdullah's Trans-Jordan capital of Amman showed no signs. He has said he would personally lead the armies of Trans-Jordan, Syria, Iraq and Lebanon. The potential Arab invasion forces were estimated at 30,000. The Jews claim a field army of more than 50,000.

Syria was placed under a state of emergency. Military leaves were cancelled; holidays were suspended. The Egyptian education minister said martial law would be proclaimed tomorrow when Egyptian army troops cross the frontier into Palestine.

## Navy Testing New Plane

NEW YORK, May 14 (AP)—The air force announced today it is air testing a tiny hitch-hiking, jet-propelled fighter designed to ride as a parasite on a B-29 bomber.

The miniature fighter is the McDonnell FX-85, a radical design adapted to stowage in the bomb bay of a B-29, which is more than 10 times as large.

Known as a "parasite" because it is based aboard another airplane, the FX-85 carries a principle tested extensively by the navy some years ago when fighters were carried inside large dirigibles.

The jet plane has a wingspan of 21 feet and is but 15 feet long. It has sweptback wings, which fold at the outer panels. Double rudders are part of the design to put the plane into the smallest possible space.

## Nature Group Slates Tour

The Nature Society of the Klamath Region will hold its first spring nature field tour on Sunday, May 16, under the leadership of Naomi H. French, Edith and Kenneth McLeod. The tour will start from the Link river bridge on Main street at 9 a. m. Sunday morning, travel to Keno, Worden, Lower Klamath lake and return to Klamath Falls; approximate distance 60 miles.

The tour is open to anyone interested in the study of nature. No charge is made, but each person planning to attend will have to provide his own transportation, lunch and water. A pair of field glasses, a book on western birds and a notebook in which to record observations will make the tour more interesting.

This tour provides the opportunity to see around 40 species of birds, the bird life of the river, forest, meadow and swamp. As an added attraction there are a number of early spring wildflowers coming into bloom.

## McKay-Hall Debate Off

PORTLAND, May 14 (AP)—There will be no debate between Gov. John McKay and State Sen. Douglas McKay on state land board policies.

The governor rejected the debate proposal, announcing his schedule before the May 21 primary already was filed.

McKay, a rival for the republican nomination for governor, issued the debate challenge after charging the sale of tidelands at Coos Bay recently was counter to an established board policy of leasing such lands.

McKay asserted the action "opened the door to looting of the irreducible school funds."

Hall in turning down the challenge said of the tidelands sale, "I was fully informed of the facts and would vote the same way again."

## School Dean Protests Move

ABERDEEN, May 14 (AP)—A formal appeal by George Allen Odgers, protesting his dismissal as dean of Grays Harbor junior college, was on file today with County School Superintendent Frank H. Bowen.

The board has 30 days in which to answer, Bowen said.

Odgers contends the board failed to provide written reasons for not renewing his contract. This failure, he says, automatically renews his contract for another year.

The board has said it considers that sufficient reasons were given in two letters of notification sent Odgers.

Odgers, dean of the college since 1946, came here from Linfield college, has been recommended to the board if Odgers' dismissal is upheld.

## Public Health Worker Honored

PORTLAND, May 14 (AP)—Mrs. J. Bishop Tingle, Eugene, received an award yesterday for 25 years' service as a charter member of the Lane County Public Health association.

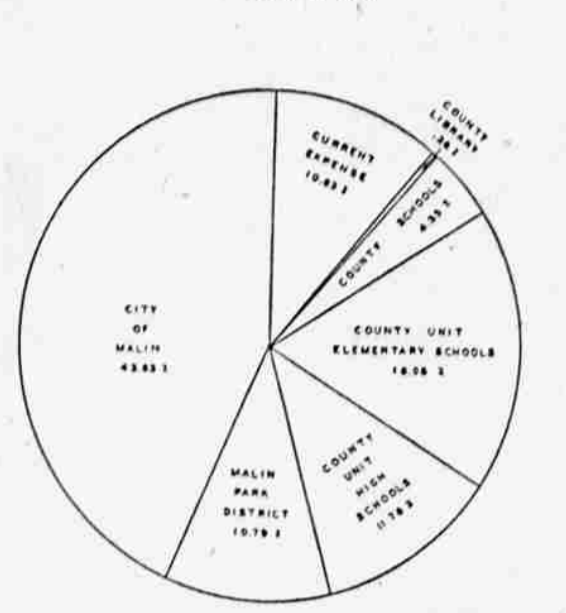
The award was presented at the annual meeting of the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health association. Mrs. Tingle has served on the board of directors of the state association since 1937.

Malin city government took 43.83 per cent, the Malin park district 10.79 per cent, Klamath county's share was 10.83 per cent, 36.1 per cent went to the county library, and the remainder, a little over 34 per cent, goes to schools. Tax rate on Malin city property this current year was 90.8 mills, highest in the county, amounting to \$90.80 on each \$1000 assessed valuation.

## Workers Over 65 Who Were Idle During Winter May Get Insurance Benefits

Workers over 65 years of age who did work during the winter months, when much of the local lumber industry was shut down, may be eligible for monthly insurance benefits if they file their application, John H. Richardson, manager of the Klamath Falls field office of the federal social security administration pointed out today. Any person who is 65 or older and who has worked sufficiently under the social security act to qualify for benefits is eligible to file a claim for monthly insurance benefits and receive payment for any month in which he does not work in covered employment and earn wages of more than \$14.99.

The wife, 65 or older, of an eligible wage earner may also file a claim and receive insurance benefits for each month her husband is entitled to payment. Claimants who intend to return to work when their employer starts operating again are free to do so; however, their benefits stop with the first month in which they earn more than \$14.99, but the benefits will begin again with the first month in which they are not working. All wages earned after returning to work will be considered in determining the benefit rate when the claimant is again eligible to receive payment.

Furthermore, a wage earner can receive unemployment compensation benefits and old age insurance benefits at the same time, if he qualifies under both programs. Anyone interested in filing his application for old age insurance or in obtaining information about the program should call at the office of the federal social security administration, room 306, federal building, Klamath Falls, or write to that office.

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## Camp White Issue To Go To Voters

SALEM, May 14 (AP)—Oregonians will vote in the November election on a proposal for the state to take over the Camp White hospital near Medford.

Petitions to place the proposal on the ballot were filed here yesterday. Lew Wallace, Portland, chairman of the sponsoring committee, said the petitions had 25,000 signatures, 6000 more than needed.

The buildings, now in the hands of the war assets administration, would be converted for use as a state hospital.

PORTLAND, May 14 (AP)—Predictions of continued good business conditions in the United States were frequent at the annual regional meeting of the National Association of Manufacturers yesterday.

Raymond Moley, columnist, editor and professor of public law at Columbia university, said good times would continue and that the republicans would win the fall election.

Ralph Robey, chief economist for the NAM, while predicting good business, also warned that "there will be points of trouble."

He said business is running about \$2,000,000,000 short of "venture capital" needed for business and industrial expansion. He said this would produce an "anemia" that must be cured.
