Bill Would Ban Wildlife Agency

WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP)—Legislation to abolish the interior department's fish and wildlife service and set up a five-member fish and wildlife commission as an independent agency has been introduced by Rep. Thor Tollefson (R-Wash.).

Under the bill, filed yesterday, the transfer of functions would be made on August 1. Tollefson said the plan is part of a long range effort to coordinate government handling of fish and wildlife problems.

Commissioners' annual salaries would be \$12,000. Two would represent commercial fishing interests, two the wildlife field and one the general public.

Sande Cleared Of Dope Charge
NEW YORK, May 15 (AP)—Earl Sande, horse owner, trainer and one-time famous jockey, was released yesterday from federal charges of illegal possession of narcotics.

A grand jury which investigated the case returned no true bill.

The Jockey club said the grand jury's action would have no effect on its 60-day suspension of Sande, imposed May 4, the day after he was arrested.

The government charged Sande had a drug which he failed to register and on which he failed to pay a tax. Conviction would have meant a two to five-year prison term.

Bergere Views Fastest Race
INDIANAPOLIS, May 15 (AP)—Cliff Bergere, who has gone around the Indianapolis speedway more times than most motorists have driven into their garages, forecasts the fastest 500-mile race May 31 since the event opened in 1911.

The tall, white-mustached veteran will try for the pole position in tomorrow's qualifications, driving a Novi's grooved piston special that holds the track 10-mile record.

"If conditions are right, it will take at least 122 miles an hour to earn one of the 33 starting positions," Bergere said.

Vet Training Pay Goes Up

New wage ceilings for veterans learning livelihoods under the GI bill will benefit a large proportion, but not all, of the 2500 now in job training in Oregon, and will open the program to others who were already earning the old ceilings.

Zeno Dent, veterans administration representative for this area, made this comment today on the new public law 512. He admitted, however, that the legislation is involved and its mechanics are not yet fully known in VA regional and local offices.

"For the time being, veterans are urged not to write in, especially those already in training," Dent advised. "Most job trainees will get the higher subsistence rates automatically, if they are entitled to them, but the first adjustments can't possibly be made before subsistence checks mailed out around July 1, and it may be August 1."

Boots will date back to April 1, he assured trainees. A printed explanation of the new law will be enclosed with the June 1 checks.

Blueback Salmon Fishing Banned

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15 (AP)—Commercial fishing for blueback salmon in the Columbia river is banned this year.

The Oregon and Washington fish commissions in joint action here yesterday forbade the fishing in an attempt to restore the depleted runs of the blueback.
