KLAMATH FALLS AND VICINITY: Considerable high cloudiness tonight and Sunday. High today 71. Low tonight 57. High Sunday 64.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA: Fair today and tonight. Gentle to moderate variable winds north and central coast and moderate west to northwest winds off south coast, becoming moderate southwesterly Sunday.

## Fykerude Rite Held Saturday

Funeral services for Sgt. Norman L. Fykerude, who was killed in action, December 22, 1944, were held at 2 p. m. Saturday at Raymond, Wash. Sgt. Fykerude, a former Klamath resident, was killed in the Battle of the Bulge.

Sgt. Fykerude was born at Willapa, Wash., December 19, 1917. He lived in Klamath Falls from 1929 to 1934 and was a paper carrier for The Herald and News. He was graduated from Raymond high school and entered the army in 1943, going overseas in June, 1944. He was awarded the Bronze Star.

Survivors are a daughter, Lynn Marie, Willapa; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Fykerude, Raymond; four brothers, Glen, Raymond and Harry of White Plains, N. Y., and Kenneth of Bend, and a sister, Mrs. Mabel Dubois of Klamath Falls.

## Minnesota National Guard Breaks Up Mob Violence At Strike-Bound Plant

**SOUTH ST. PAUL, Minn., May 15 (AP)—**A wedge of 400 national guardsmen, helmeted and with bayonets fixed, swept the streets clear of an unruly crowd, estimated at 500 persons in front of the strike-bound Swift & Co. packing plant here today.

The troops were formed as the crowd gathered to boo and shout catcalls as workers entered the plant through lines of guardsmen.

Col. Lester Hancock, troop commander, ordered the formation an hour after reading a proclamation to the crowd from a sound truck.

Hancock said through the loud-speaker that any assembly of more than four persons over a large area of downtown South St. Paul would be considered unlawful.

**Quiet Move**—Except for minor difficulties in moving those persons closest to the advancing troops—they were being pressed upon from the fringes—the crowd dispersed quietly. The two-block area in front of the Swift plant was cleared in 10 minutes.

Reading of the order followed numerous scuffles between the guardsmen and picket line sympathizers.

Hancock explained the troops were there to aid civil authorities, adding that "my men are here to maintain law and order. We have no interest in either side of this dispute."

He ordered the clearing of Concord street, the community's main thoroughfare, for a distance of 12 blocks. This area covers the entrances to both the Swift and Armour plants.

The previously unruly crowd remained quiet as the colonel spoke. There was no demonstration when he finished.

As workers' cars started to go through the thinned picket lines earlier, several minor disorders occurred, one of them when a man in the crowd attempted to seize a guardsman's rifle.

Persons in the crowd shouted boos, curses and catcalls. Some sang the national anthem mockingly.

More than 25 automobiles loaded with workers moved into the plant in quick succession. The crowd lining the edge of Grand avenue near the Swift plant entrance shouted threats and surged forward as the workers drove by.

Guardsmen, their bayonets at point, drove the crowd back. Within a few minutes, a large convoy of national guard trucks loaded with troops, moved into the plant.

The crowd roared opposition and many gave simulated Nazi salutes as the trucks rolled by.

It was the first time workers had been able to enter the Swift plant since last Wednesday when massed pickets, defying a Dakota county district court restraining order, halted everyone, including South St. Paul police and sheriff's deputies. Several clashes occurred when police tried to open the massed lines.

**OFF AGAIN**—PORTLAND, May 15 (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey was off today on a seven-town tour with his first stop at Hillsboro.

From there his schedule called for talks at Forest Grove, Tillamook, Garibaldi, Wheeler, Seaside and Astoria.

The New Yorker was to leave Astoria at 9 p. m. on the return to Portland.

## Youth Drowns In Sawmill Log Pond

**COTTAGE GROVE, May 15 (AP)—**LeRoy George Pullen, Culp creek, drowned here late Friday when he fell into the Bohemia lumber mill pond near here while fishing. A companion, Stanley Sherman, 12, jumped in to save his partner but was not able to swim well enough to affect the rescue. Workers at the sawmill recovered the body within 40 minutes, but efforts to revive the youth failed. The youth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Pullen.

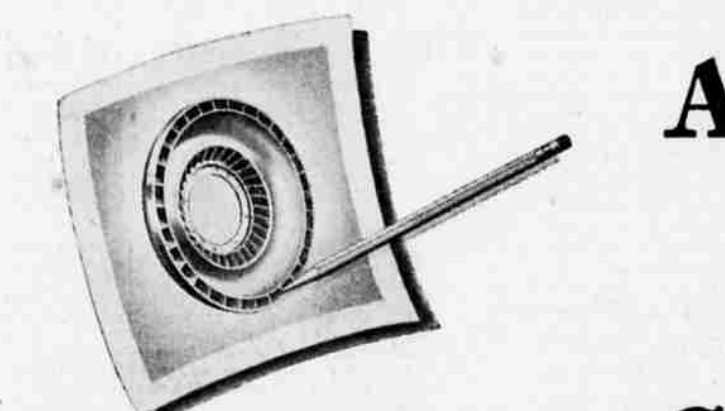
