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Today's Roundup

SOME of the things on which people will vote in the primary election next Friday are strictly party matters.

These include the selection of republican and democratic national committees and committeewomen, selection of delegates to the two national conventions, and selection of presidential electors.

Only one Klamath man is running for delegate to a national convention this year. He is E. P. Ivory, local lumberman, a candidate for delegate-at-large to the democratic national convention.

Klamath democrats will want to cast their votes for Mr. Ivory. In an at-large election of this kind, it is difficult for upstate men to get the necessary votes.

Another Klamath county democrat whose name appears on the ballot is Jesse Z. Smith, Merrill, running for presidential elector.

Four are to be elected as delegates-at-large in the republican party. Fourteen are running. This department suggests you take your pick on the basis of the names and ballots slogans, but I personally do not intend to vote for Henry Black who says he favors Henry Black for president.

For Engdahl... NOW, let's take a look at the republican situation. There, Mrs. Marshall Cornett of Klamath county is running for national committeewoman. She is unopposed, but Klamath people should not fail to mark X in front of her name as a courtesy vote from her home county.

For delegate from the second congressional district, voters have a choice of two out of eight candidates. One of my votes goes surely to State Senator Carl Engdahl of Pendleton, a firm friend of Klamath county.

Mr. Engdahl, as a member of the subcommittee on education of the legislature's ways and means committee, 1947 session, was instrumental in pulling our vocational school appropriation out of the fire. He has always worked closely with Klamath's legislative delegation—has shared hotel suites with its male members, in fact.

My other vote will go either to Marvin Klemme, Burns, who is well known here, or to Sam Coon of Baker county, who is highly recommended by Lee Jacobs, ex-Klamathite living at Baker.

These Days

AT the very moment that the government is forced to seize the railroads of the country because willful men refuse to recognize any factors in life but their personal desires and purposes, a meeting took place in New York "strengthening spiritual foundations." This was the 17th annual conference of the Chaplains Association of the Army and Navy of the United States.

I looked at their program long and hard. For on its cover was a painting of drowning men and some whom the sea would not devour because of the challenging bravery of others. It is an overpowering picture of loyalty and devotion.

There stand Clark V. Poling, Protestant minister, John P. Washington, Catholic priest, Alexander D. Goode, Jewish rabbi, and George L. Fox, Protestant minister. They stand close together holding hands as the ship goes down. They died holding hands, a brotherhood in the eternity of God, together as one man.

Sacrifice... THESE clergymen were passengers on the troop transport, the S.S. Dorchester, which was torpedoed off Greenland in the early morning of February 3, 1943. With complete disregard for their safety, these chaplains made their way on deck and went among the confused, fear-stricken men. And finally they gave their lifejackets to four sons of American parents—these boys had lost theirs in the hysterical excitement. While others had a chance for life, these chaplains had none. "They died that all men may live in peace."

We Know The Goal... OUR shortcomings are many, but our worthiness is that we acknowledge them. We know the goal and if we often fail to achieve it, we nonetheless always keep our soul's eye upon it. And the greatness of our chaplain's service in the army and navy and in the air force and the veterans administration is that we do not leave our children at war or in the preparation for an aftermath of war without the ministrations of those who love both God and America and seek to keep them close to each other. This is symbolized by the shield upon which rests a crucifix lying upon the bosom of the Torah. And this is the prayer of the final session of this program of those who wear the military uniforms of the most powerful nation on earth— "God, protect our people from the illusion and despair that racks the souls of men who live in tiny spheres. Teach us to be generous and chivalrous in our treatment of the weak. Help us to know the truth and the truth will make us free. Strengthen our confidence in Thy justice, might, and power. Inspire us to be Thy servants of peace and freedom, and always Thy worthy sons. Amen."

The World Today

This tragic Arab-Jewish war, which has been allowed to develop through the failure of world statesmanship to carry out its stewardship, poses many speculative problems for those trying to foresee the outcome.

Barring success in the new mediation which the United Nations is undertaking, the conflict bids fair in the long run to produce a decision in the old feud between these two races.

At its worst it could be fought to a bloody finish which would leave the defeated side knocked out and the victor in possession of the entire Holy Land.

However, while we must be prepared for the worst—and even for the terrors of a Holy War—I don't think we need to regard this as inevitable, the way the signs now read. There are several other possibilities, among which are these: 1. The extent of the invasion of Palestine by the troops of neighboring Arab nations is by no means certain. The Arabs are not a wholly united race. There are many acute differences among the various nations, and some of the greatest clashes revolve about the reported ambitions of King Abdullah of Trans-Jordan to extend his domain and power. This being so, there is always the possibility that the joint invasion might peter out, especially since the Jews have the biggest active army in the Middle East.

Uneasy Truce... Some observers feel that there is a chance King Abdullah might set up a government in that part of Palestine not claimed by the Jews. Then would follow an uneasy truce, and ultimately the Arabs and Jews would get together and agree on a division of the Holy Land into two nations.

In tomorrow's presentation of "The Clock," at 5:30 p. m., the ghost of a deceased writer returns to take a hand in the lives of living writers. Now, a writer's ghost—especially if he was a newswriter—would likely be very obnoxious, particularly if he was inspiring or hindering a live contemporary. Should be good listening.

A dinner party given for a visiting celebrity 2000 years ago, which proved very boring to the guest of honor, will be the pivotal scene of "Thou Shall be Recompensed," the dramatization to be heard during the ABC broadcast of "The Greatest Story Ever Told," tomorrow over LW at 7:30 p. m.

The Arabs, on the other hand, are attacking under difficulties. As this column pointed out earlier in the week, their problem of supplying their armies will be great. Not only are their lines of communications long, but they run through much desert country and other difficult terrain. So taking it all in all, the Jews have much justification for the optimism they are displaying.

Truman Sees Himself In White House For Next 4 Years In Opening Speech

By ERNEST B. YACCAIRO WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP)—President Truman set the stage today for a fighting political campaign with a confident prediction of victory over republican "obstructionists."

"I want to say to you at this time that during the next four years there will be a democrat in the White House, and you are looking at him," he told a cheering audience of young democrats last night.

But at the same time he said he hopes foreign policy will be kept out of the 1948 presidential contest. The setting for his first avowedly political speech since the March announcement of his willingness to run for a four-year term was the \$25-a-plate dinner of the Young Democrats of America.

Mr. Truman spoke from notes, but without a prepared manuscript. This is the procedure he is expected to follow in platform appearances on his pre-convention swing to the West Coast in June. The president was emphatic in his assertion that the bi-partisan foreign policy should not be dragged into the political campaign.

Earthquake On Ocean Floor Causes Tidal Wave Alarm, But Hawaii, Aleutians OK

HONOLULU, May 15 (AP)—A major earthquake apparently on the floor of the Pacific sea sent tidal wave alerts flying yesterday to the Aleutians and Hawaii yesterday, but no high waves appeared.

Before the alerts were called off some Hawaiians had fled to the hills. Freighters, fishing sampans and other small craft in the port of Hilo put to sea. Trucks and heavy cranes were moved to high ground.

The memory was still fresh of the tidal wave disaster of 1946 which caused 175 deaths in the Hawaiian islands from an Aleutian earth shock. No one was taking any chances. Even the populous Oahu, which is more protected, swimmers were warned to get out of the water. Military service personnel was alerted.

Precautions also were taken in the Aleutians, where the army, navy and coast guard have men stationed on some of the islands. The U. S. coast and geodetic survey station at Barber's point said the center of the submarine disturbance apparently was near Unalaska, the first Aleutian island west of Unalaska, where Dutch Harbor is located. This is to the west of the North Pacific deep where the earth slide of 1946 kicked up the disastrous waves that hit Hawaii and the Aleutians. Ten persons were drowned in the Aleutians in that one.

The only ship at sea reporting it felt the quake was the motor vessel Square Knot, 100 miles or less northwest of Unalaska. The Square Knot radiated that "a severe earthquake with a violent bouncing motion experienced on smooth sea."

The University of Washington seismograph at Seattle recorded a tremor of strong intensity at 2:38 a. m. yesterday and three hours later the shocks were still in progress. The American mandrake root can yield laxative medicine.
