

# ARAB TROOPS DRIVE ON TEL AVIV

UNITED NATIONS atomic energy commission decides today by a vote of 9 to 2 to drop world control of atomic warfare. It has been trying for two years to do something about it, but has got nowhere because of Russia's refusal to accept any kind of control except her kind. In the final showdown, Russia and the Soviet Ukraine vote AGAINST the proposal to drop efforts to secure international control. All the way through, Russia and the Soviet Ukraine have voted AGAINST CONTROL.

It sounds screwball, of course, but isn't as absurd as it sounds. Russia wants delay. She is working on the atom bomb herself. Nothing could serve her purpose better than for United Nations to go on talking control indefinitely, but doing nothing about it, while Russia goes ahead with her efforts to develop an atom bomb of her own.

IN Washington today, a house armed services subcommittee approves unanimously a bill that clears the way for the navy to get started on a 60,000-ton giant aircraft carrier.

This new ship, if built, will be about a half bigger than the navy's present BIGGEST carriers. Its flight deck would be so large that MULTIPLE-ENGINE BOMBERS could take off from it with ease.

(DONT, however, jump to any wrong conclusions. Giant aircraft carriers of this class won't be in use right away. The dispatch adds that in the neighborhood of FOUR YEARS will be required to build the first one.)

INFLATION note:  
The Chinese dollar, which used to be worth four bits in U. S. money, has just been raised officially to 47,000 to one U. S. dollar. That is the official rate of exchange. The black market rate is probably much higher.
