Ankeny Gets 5-Year Term From Judge

Lewis Hurley Ankeny, 38, was sentenced to five years in prison on conviction of larceny by bailer Saturday by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg, and a notice of appeal was filed immediately by Defense Attorney Ben Anderson.

Ankeny was convicted two weeks ago after a jury trial. The charge grew out of the collapse of his stock brokerage business here in 1946.

Free on Bail

He has been free on \$5000 bail, but after the sentence the amount was ordered raised to \$10,000 by Judge Vandenberg, pending outcome of the appeal. Ankeny was placed in the county jail to wait until the extra money is raised.

In other circuit court action Saturday morning, trial of Homer Franklin, indicted for first degree murder, was continued from April 24 until June 21, because three defense witnesses would be unable to get to court for the earlier date.

The district attorney's office agreed to the continuation. Franklin is accused of murdering his wife last November 30 and burying her body in the backyard of their suburban home. He is in the county jail.

Grappler Sued By Fan After Armory Fracas

The Klamath Falls boxing commission and Grappler Glen (Buddy) Knox appear headed for a \$5000 legal wrestling match with the institution of a damage suit for that amount by Leo S. Epps, 2430 Apple-

gate. Epps charges that he was assaulted and beaten by Knox during a wrestling show at the armory Friday night, April 30. That night Knox was one participant in a tag team match which finally involved several spectators and the police, as well as the wrestlers.

Named as defendants in the suit, along with Knox, is the local boxing commission, composed of R. A. Stein, Walter Thompson, Roy Raker, straw, Leslie Wright and Dr. George H. Adler.

The boxing commission hired Knox to appear here and is responsible for the wrestler's actions, the suit contends, adding that Knox is a man of violent temper and given to attacks on members of the audience.

Epps claims his injuries included two black eyes and a broken nasal bone. His attorney is U. S. Balentine.

Truman Vetoes Loyalty Check

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—President Truman Saturday vetoed legislation providing for an FBI checkup on the loyalty of presidential appointees to the atomic energy commission.

Mr. Truman said the bill "is wholly unnecessary and unwise." He also called it "an unwarranted encroachment of the legislative upon the executive branch."

The measure would have authorized the five senators on the congressional joint atomic energy committee to direct the FBI to investigate the "character, associations and loyalty" of any person appointed to the commission.

Present law requires FBI investigations of all atomic energy commission employees who are not subject to senate confirmation.

Senator Knox (R-Calif.), sponsor of the bill, contended that congress and in particular senate members of the joint atomic committee are entitled to all possible information on key officials.

Knowland told a reporter he would ask the senate to override the president.

Prisoner Hangs Self In Cell

YREKA, Calif., May 17 — Fred Theodore Hall, 28, of Yreka, was found dead at 9:30 p. m. Friday, after he had hanged himself in the Yreka city jail, according to authorities.

Hall had been jailed on a drunk and disorderly charge signed by his wife, Eva, after a family quarrel on a downtown street. Hall hanged himself with his belt, police said.

Hall's was the second self-inflicted death in a Siskiyou jail within two weeks. On May 3, Hugh Herbert Hughs, 45, of Los Angeles, died in the Siskiyou county jail from a severed jugular vein. Hughs was also held on a minor charge.

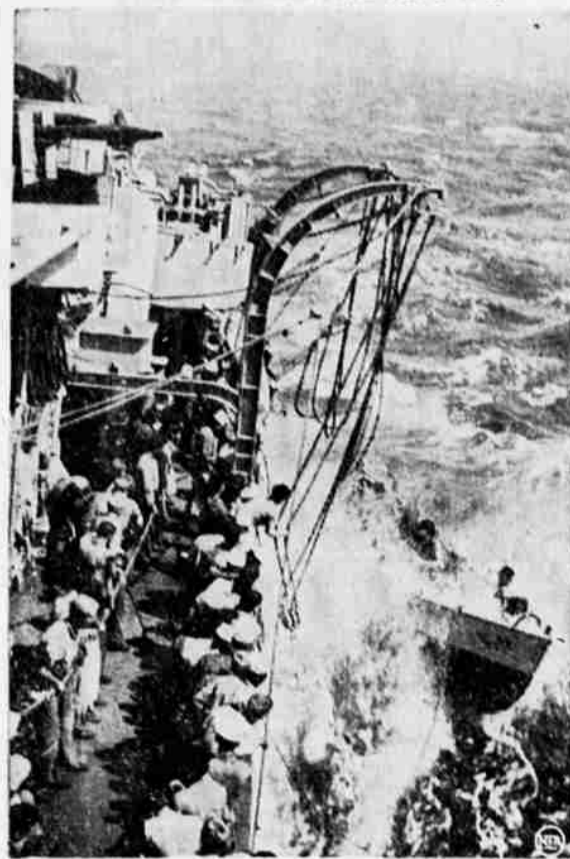

Dr. Scheetz' Death Told

GRANTS PASS, May 17 (AP)—Dr. Orville H. Scheetz, prominent Grants Pass optometrist, former member of the state house of representatives and past secretary-treasurer of the Oregon State Optometrist association, died here suddenly Friday afternoon from a heart attack.

A boyhood resident of Baker, Dr. Scheetz at one time operated a pharmacy in Vancouver, Wash., and was chief pharmacist for Frank Rau, of Portland.

In January, 1942, Dr. Scheetz was elected chairman of the Josephine county republican central committee, a position he held when appointed by the governor to the lower house to fill the term of Kenneth Martin, present state game commission member, who resigned to enter the navy.

He Came Out In A Hurry At Least

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., May 17 (AP)—Part of a bathroom blew up Saturday, scaring the daylight out of a plumber.

Mrs. Gwen Bordwine, owner of the suburban building, credited him with a "supersonic" escape. The unidentified plumber was not hurt.

A typewriter firm had just vacated the place and the plumber's employers were moving in. Mrs. Bordwine said the former occupants apparently poured out some inflammable cleaning fluid but didn't flush it down.

The plumber touched a match to a cigarette, tossed it into the bowl—and went sailing out the door amid a shower of broken porcelain. But he grabbed a garden hose and dashed right back to douse the resulting fire. Damage was slight.

Nuclear Fuel Men Needed

NEW YORK, May 17 (AP)—The General Electric company said Saturday trained engineers were needed in the production of the nuclear fuel called plutonium at the Hanford works at Richland, Wash., and that applications would be received in New York, May 17-21.

The plant is operated by General Electric for the U. S. atomic energy commission.

Engineers must have considerable experience in heavy construction in order to qualify for positions now open, General Electric said.

Progress on the improvement program within the nuclear fuel manufacturing areas of the Hanford works has been rapid, the company added.

Hanford is the only plant in the United States producing plutonium on an industrial scale.
