War Dead To Return Here

The body of Platoon Sergeant Luther Thornton, United States marine corps, will be returned to the United States from the South Pacific on the U. S. army transport Albert M. Roe, the 22-year-old marine's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Foster D. Thornton, 1801 Worden, have been notified.

Date of the arrival of the Roe has not been learned. Sgt. Thornton, killed on Iwo Jima March 7, 1945, was born in Prescott, Ariz., and moved here with his family in 1926. He attended Fairview grade school and KUHS and was graduated while in service with the marine corps.

During the Bougainville campaign, young Thornton received the Silver Star for gallantry in action with the 3rd marine division. He had volunteered for two hazardous missions but on the third, during the Iwo Jima fighting, he was killed.

Volunteers were sought to use a demolition bomb on a crippled Jap tank which still held gunfire and Thornton asked for the job. He had accomplished his mission and was en route back to join his platoon when he fell.

In addition to his parents, Sgt. Thornton is survived by six brothers and sisters. Final rites will be announced by Ward's.

Angler Guesses Right On Minnie

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 18 (AP)—At noon March 12 a sporting goods store here put 288 minnows in an "electric bucket"—a bait-preserving device.

More than 33,000 Oklahoma City anglers guessed when the last minnow would die.
