

Heated Words Fly As City Dads Wade Into Argument Over Transfer Of Money

The city council's old familiar flare for heated words turned up after an absence of several weeks Monday night over transfer of city funds. Councilmen, with the exception of A. F. Condey, agreed to transfer \$35,000 from the city's property fund to the general fund and from there into the jail fund.

Sharp words resulted in a compromise to the extent that the money go from the property fund into the general fund, but with no mention of the jail fund.

Objection Raised

Condey objected strongly to a previous motion passed while he was absent last week mentioning the transfer to the jail fund. He pointed out that the budget, "cut to the bone," falls about \$43,000 short of anticipated needs for the 1948-49 fiscal year.

The budget committee submitted a recommendation that the council not pass the proposed transfer.

When Condey said he believed the council should acknowledge the budget committee's recommendation, Mayor Ed Ostendorf declared, "They (the budget committee) had no business making that recommendation."

Condey, holding out for a transfer of the \$35,000 to the general fund so that the budget committee can decide where it is most needed, fared, "I'll have it no part of this. Do you think for a minute I'm going to fall for that? It's a trick."

The Brown car started to pass a second machine, also Klamath bound, when it apparently struck a slick spot in the pavement. It was raining at the time.

The machine overturned and Reeves, asleep in the back seat, was thrown against the glass. He suffered lacerations of the face and ear and has multiple bruises. Young Reeves was treated at Hillside hospital but was dismissed to return home.

Driver of the second car was not learned but it is understood passengers were KUHS seniors en route home from Ashland where they had enjoyed senior "skip day." The car stopped and occupants gave aid.

Brown, West and Reeves were en route home to spend the day with their families as today, Tuesday, is campus day at SOU and no classes were scheduled. The three said they were going to study for finals.
