

Voters Give Budget OK In County

With reports in from all but five polling places, the county school budget and excess over the 6 per cent limitation was assured of passage today.

The latest total of voting in Monday's election showed: 376 for the budget; 27 against the budget.

Voting was virtually the same in the question of permitting the district to exceed the 6 per cent limitation.

Only precincts not yet heard from this morning were Weyerhaeuser camp, Port Klamath, Shevlin, Sprague River, Crescent Lake.
