

Truman To Give Speech At College

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—President Truman will speak for 10 to 15 minutes when he visits Stephen Girard college at Philadelphia Thursday.

His press secretary, Charles G. Ross, told reporters Mr. Truman probably will speak extemporaneously.

The address is scheduled to start at 1:05 p.m. (PST). It will be carried by both radio and television.

Ross said the trip "has no political aspect whatsoever."

Ross said the White House is continuing work on the president's forthcoming trip to the West Coast, starting from Washington June 3. Mr. Truman will speak in Chicago June 4 at the opening of the observance of the 100th anniversary of Swedish immigration into the Midwest. He will speak at Omaha, Neb., June 5 at the annual reunion of the 35th division with which he served in World War I.

The schedule also calls for an address at commencement exercises at the University of California June 12, a speech in San Francisco June 13 and one in Los Angeles June 14.

The schedule also includes a speech at Seattle June 10 and at Portland, Ore., June 11 after a visit with Gov. Mon Wallgren at Olympia June 9.

2-Year Draft Said Necessary

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—Rep. Andrews (R-N. Y.) said Tuesday a two-year draft law revival is necessary "unless we are willing to gamble dangerously with the national security."

Andrews, chairman of the house armed services committee, asked the rules committee to clear for house action a draft bill approved 20 to 5 by his committee early this month. Rules committee reluctance to approve the draft became clear as soon as the hearing began.

Rep. Brown (R-Ohio) presidential campaign manager for Senator Taft (R-Ohio), asked Andrews whether a draft would be necessary if President Truman does not approve steps to build the air force up to 70 combat groups.

Andrews said a draft is needed right now to bring the army up to strengths already authorized.

"Well," Brown remarked, "reports are current that the president and Secretary of Defense Forrestal won't spend the money for 70 groups. The president is under no compulsion to do so."
