

US Sergeant Protests US Red Policy

MOSCOW, May 19 (AP)—The Russian radio broadcast Tuesday a letter in which Sgt. James M. McMullin of the U. S. army is quoted as saying he intends to stay here "as a protest against the anti-Soviet policies of the capitalists who at present rule America."

The letter was said to have been addressed by McMullin, of the military attaché's office of the U. S. embassy in Moscow, to the mayor of Moscow and to U. S. Ambassador Walter B. Smith, who is fishing in France.

"Living in the United States, I did not think there existed a system of government such as exists here in the Soviet Union, in which the common man is looked after and which is directed towards constant improvement of the mode of life and the culture of the people."

"The future belongs to this country."

The Moscow press and radio gave much attention to the case, without editorial comment.

The state department announced in Washington Sunday night that McMullin, 21-year-old son of a regular army colonel, had been absent without leave from his embassy post since Friday and added that he obviously had been "seduced and exploited by an experienced Soviet woman agent."

She was identified as Mrs. Galina Dunayeva Biconish, wife of another U. S. army man, T. Sgt. John Biconish, 23, of Birmingham, N. Y., whose parents said separation proceedings have been instituted.

In Washington Monday night, two former Moscow buddies of Sgt. McMullin told the Washington Post that McMullin was a victim of a standard Soviet practice of using fascinating women to entice American embassy men.

State Fair Slates Governor's Day

SALEM, May 19 (AP)—The Oregon state fair will hold a special day honoring mayors of the state's cities on Thursday, September 9, Fair Manager Leo Spitzbart said today. It will be the first time such a day has been held.

The fair will be held September 6 to 12. Mayor Robert Elstrom of Salem, president of the League of Oregon Cities, said he expected 200 mayors to attend on the day set aside in their honor.

More than 5,000 premium lists for the fair were mailed to exhibitors this week.

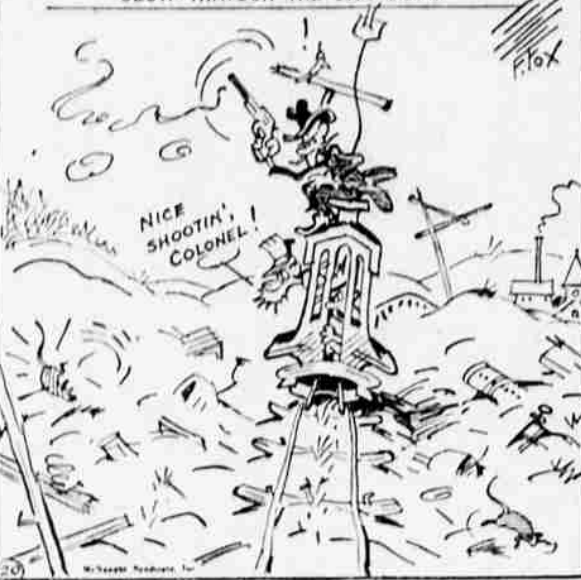

Safeway Stores To Close Down Warehouses Here

Faster and more efficient distribution of foods was assured its Southern Oregon stores today when Safeway stores announced that on May 29 it would close its grocery and produce "rehandling" warehouses at Klamath Falls. The grocery warehouse is on Riverside and the produce warehouse is on Spring.

"These two warehouses were opened in 1944 to offset wartime merchandise shortages and lack of dependable transportation for our stores here and at Merrill, Lakeview, Medford and Grants Pass," M. B. Houser, Safeway district manager, explained.

"It is now possible to expand our distribution facilities and make direct shipments of perishable produce to our Southern Oregon stores. More frequent delivery of other grocery items will result also in improved supplies at our stores. Managers and other members of our Southern Oregon staffs are glad that it no longer will be necessary to operate under a war-time handicap of delayed, extra handling. Rapid distribution is the keystone of Safeway quality and service.

Employees at the two Klamath

Falls warehouses are being assigned other positions wherever possible. Houser said. Ted Reeves, local supply manager; R. J. Strauser, grocery warehouse manager, and Norman B. Allen, produce warehouse manager, are transferring to similar positions with Safeway at Portland. Drivers of the Southern Oregon truck routes are being assigned "regular runs" in Safeway's distributive system.
