

# PACKINGHOUSE PICKET KILLED

## In The Day's News

RESULTS of the shooting war in Palestine are still confused. As his is written, both sides claim to be doing all right in Jerusalem. What is happening elsewhere in the stricken Holy Land is vague and uncertain. Time will tell us more.

THE security council of United Nations, this morning's dispatches report, appears likely to approve a British plan for MEDIATION of the Palestine fighting. We and the Russians have been calling for the use of armed force to stop the fighting, but neither of us is willing to let the other do the forcing. We're frankly afraid that if Russia gets an army into Palestine she'll never move it out. Presumably the Russians wouldn't be willing to let us do the stopping with our armed forces. Nobody else dares to.

It seems probable that UN's security council will turn down the American-Russian plan and take on the British proposal. For one thing, there is less dynamite in mediation than in the use of armed force.

It hurts our pride to have to admit it, but up to the present moment it certainly looks like every move we've made in Palestine has been wrong. We seem to have been all thumbs.

IN Washington, the house of representatives passes the Mundt-Nixon anti-communist bill which Stassen and Dewey debated in Oregon by a vote of about five to one. The vote in the senate, when the bill gets there, is expected to be much closer.

It would be all right with this writer to jail all card-holding communists until ships can be found to send them to Russia—which is where they ought to be. If they're so hot for communism, why don't they head for the Soviet Union, where they can enjoy its benefits to the full?

This writer doubts, however, if most anti-communist laws will do any good. At the last count, we had about 27 such laws already. It will take more than LAW to handle communism. Common sense will help a lot. It is this writer's notion that anybody who would even consider communism as an alternative for Americanism ought to have his head examined.

STRAW in the wind: Norway and Denmark have asked for U. S. ARMS. Russia has been aiming pointed criticism at both recently. When Russia begins to criticize a small nation, something is afoot. Both the Norwegians and the Danes have long been opposed to war. Both love liberty. In the grim modern world, it is becoming apparent that liberty must be defended or it may be lost.

Hence the Norwegians and Danish request for U. S. guns.

WE learn from Washington this morning that the navy's P2V Neptune, a two-engined bomber weighing 35 tons, has been successfully launched from an aircraft carrier's deck. (The weight of a normal carrier plane is less than 10 tons.) It is believed that the Neptune can be modified to make it possible to COME BACK AND LAND ON THE CARRIER'S DECK.

This is the point:

Atom weapons (including radioactive clouds) HAVE TO BE GOT TO THE TARGET if they are to be effective. There are two ways for us to get them to a distant target. One is by means of planes that can fly from the U. S. and back for another load.

Another way is to get the planes closer to the target by means of aircraft carriers.
