

# 300,000 Voters Expected To Turn Up At Polls For Tomorrow's Big Election

SALEM, May 20 (AP)—More than 300,000 voters are expected to drop their ballots between 8 a. m. and 8 p. m. tomorrow in Oregon's 1861 ballot boxes.

The candidates, running for more offices than have ever before been up for election, will wind up their campaigns tonight with final radio appeals.

At stake are positions for president, U. S. senator, four congressional seats, governor, secretary of state, treasurer, attorney general, convention delegates, 18 of 30 state senate seats, all 69 state house seats, national congressman and committeewoman of each party, circuit judges and district attorneys. There also will be county and city elections at the same time.

**Black-Out**  
A paradox has been that while the state elections are doubly important this year, they have been almost blacked out by the intensive campaigns by Harold E. Dewey for the state's 12 votes at the republican convention.

Each has campaigned harder than any candidate for a state office. Each has seen more of Oregon in a few weeks than most of the other candidates have seen in their whole lives.

Of the 323,490 republican voters, more than 225,000 are expected to vote. But only about 125,000 of the 302,546 democrats are expected to vote because of the few contests on their ballot.

Dewey and Stassen haven't campaigned hard just because they want 12 more delegates. The real reason is that they hope by winning Oregon, they could get a hand wagon rolling that would cause un-instructed delegates from other states to hop aboard.

Oregon's convention delegates have to vote for the people's preference until they are released. Statehouse politicians believe the interest in the presidential race has been a big advantage to present office holders who are seeking reelection. They think the Dewey-Stassen battle has made it hard for newcomers to become known.

U. S. Senator Guy Gordon, Roseburg, doesn't have a contest for republican renomination. Two democrats are after his job, though. They are State Rep. Marley J. Wilson, St. Helens, and Dr. Louis A. Wood, who teaches economics at the University of Oregon.

Oregon's four congressmen, all republicans, have opposition in the primary, but they are heavily favored because their opponents are not well-known and are new to politics.

Another interesting contest is secretary of state Earl T. Newbry's race for republican renomination against George Flagg, who was deputy secretary of state for nine years and public utilities commissioner for four years.

The republican contest for state treasurer is the closest of all. Three men, all active in public life, want the job. They are Ormond R. Bean, former public utilities commissioner and formerly Portland city commissioner; State Senator Howard C. Belton of Canby, and Sigfrid B. Unander, 34, a Portland war veteran who was executive assistant to former Governor Charles A. Sprague.

## Better Weather Is Forecast

PORTLAND, May 20 (AP)—Election day in Oregon is expected to have showers west of the Cascades and generally fair skies with some high cloudiness east of the mountains, the weather bureau reported today.

The forecaster said that an analysis of upper-air movements and additional reports from Pacific ocean areas were to be available later in the day and might alter the forecast, although the situation seemed reasonably stable.

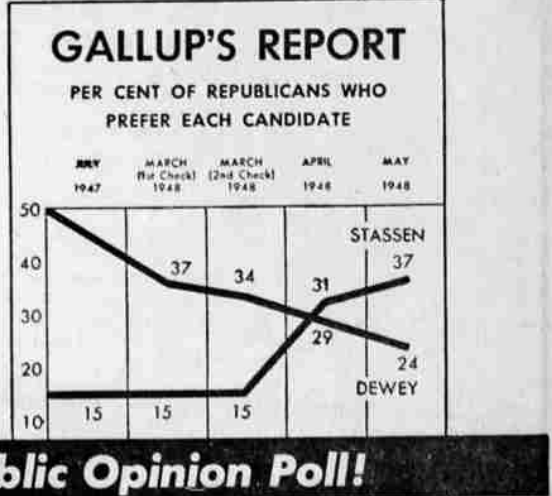
