CHICAGO, May 20 (AP)—Most interest in grains today centered around the expiring May contracts, which experienced erratic price movements.

The commodity credit corporation announced it took 1,035,550 bushels of wheat at all markets yesterday.

Wheat was 1/4 cent higher, May \$2.46 1/4, corn was 1/2 cent higher, May \$2.33 1/4, oats were 1/4 cent higher, May \$1.13 1/4-11 1/4, and soybeans were 8 cents lower to 1 cent higher, May \$4.17.

Stocks Show Good Boost

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP)—The stock market advanced today on expanded volume.

Buying was on a selective basis but advances of fractions to around 3 points were well distributed. The revival in demand was accompanied by increased turnover, with the day's activity at the rate of around 3,400,000 shares.

Among the various industrial groups most in demand were airlines, metals, oils and golds. Individual issues in many cases sold at the highest levels of the year or longer.

Among the gainers were Schenley, National Distillers, Pan-American Air, Northern Pacific, U. S. Steel, General Motors, Chrysler (despite a strike), Studebaker, Pacific Western, Kennecott, Phelps Dodge, and Transcontinental & Western Air.

The list lost considerable ground in the morning, continuing Wednesday's and Tuesday's weakness, but later recouped all of its losses.

Among the few marked down at one time were Doublass Aircraft, International Harvester, and Gulf Oil.

Tule School Election Slow Against Circus

TULELAKE, Calif., May 20—Little interest is being shown in the school election locally. Polls will be open from 1 to 3 p. m., Friday for voting to elect board members for the Siskiyou joint union high school, Tulelake elementary school, Winema elementary and Carr elementary.

Interest has centered mainly around the two candidates for that section for the high school board, Dr. C. C. Dickinson and McCloud, and George Tebbe of Yreka, both incumbents, seeking re-election.

In the Tulelake elementary election, Douglas Thomas is up for reelection, the only name on that ballot.

Hold-over members of that board are Don Potter and LeRoy Coyner. In Winema district there have been no filings for the vacancy. The decision will be based on write-in votes. Harry Mitchell is the retiring member of the board. Hold-overs are Bert Johnson and W. H. Anderson.

House OK's Army Bill

WASHINGTON, May 20 (AP)—The house passed by voice today a \$207,930,000 army construction bill for improving bases and posts from Iceland to Hawaii.

The bill now goes to a senate-house conference committee to work out differences between the house version and a similar senate bill passed last year. The senate measure would authorize about \$250,000,000 worth of work.

The measure does not make any money available. It simply authorized future appropriations to finance the project.

The house voted to limit all family quarters, for officers and enlisted men, to 1,080 square feet. They passed a cost approximately \$14,040 per family. Originally the bill proposed up to \$27,500 each for general quarters.

The bill will provide for 4,378 homes of three bedrooms each.

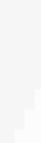
