KLAMATH FALLS AND VICINITY. Partly cloudy with scattered showers or thunderstorms tonight, clearing Saturday. High today about 63. Low tonight 40. High Saturday 65.

WESTERN OREGON: Generally fair and slightly warmer with scattered thunderstorms over mountains today. Partly cloudy and cooler with scattered showers Saturday. High today 70 to 80 except 60 to 70 along coast. Lows tonight 48 to 53. High 60 to 70. Gentle westerly winds off coast.

EASTERN OREGON: Partly cloudy with scattered afternoon showers in eastern mountains today and Saturday. Little change in temperature. High 70 to 80. Lows 45 to 50.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA: Mostly cloudy today with scattered showers. Partly cloudy tonight and Saturday with few light showers tonight. Slightly warmer Saturday. Moderate to moderate west wind off coast, except variable above Point Arena today.

Alaska Rivers Burst Banks

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, May 21 (AP)—Interior Alaska is suffering flood damage as a result of the ice break-up in northern rivers.

The village of Nenana was under four feet of water and riverside residents of Fairbanks have been driven from their homes by floods.

In Edmonton, Alta., the western command said a flash flood Sunday washed out a bridge on the Alaska highway at mile 1200 miles northwest of Edmonton.

Eight sections of the 15-span, 212-foot bridge over the lower Rancheria river between Watson lake and White Horse, both in the Yukon, were swept away in the floods. The river rose more than 10 feet.

Army engineers rebuilding the bridge hope to have the road opened to traffic May 26.

Sources of domestic water for both Fairbanks and Nenana have been put out of order or the water polluted.

George Gale, Alaska railroad telegrapher at Nenana, reported that every store and home in the surrounding and Indian village of 300 had at least a few inches of water over its floors. The water was still rising last night.

West Side Man On Soil Job

LAKEVIEW, May 21—Raymond Johnson, West Side rancher, was appointed chairman of the Lakeview Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors at its regular meeting Thursday, May 13. Johnson replaces Loren Hunt, past chairman who sold his farm and became ineligible to hold office on the district board.

The supervisors also appointed five men whom they are asking to serve as advisors to work and meet with the regular members, according to Elgin Cornett, who is secretary. This new advisory board includes Don Hotchkiss, Harry Kolbe, Jimmy Ogle, Tom Crawford and Herbert Stover.

The meeting last week included a discussion of Lakeview and Goose Lake soils by Bill Hadravsky who is the SCS soils man stationed here. This soils discussion proved to be very popular with the farmers present.

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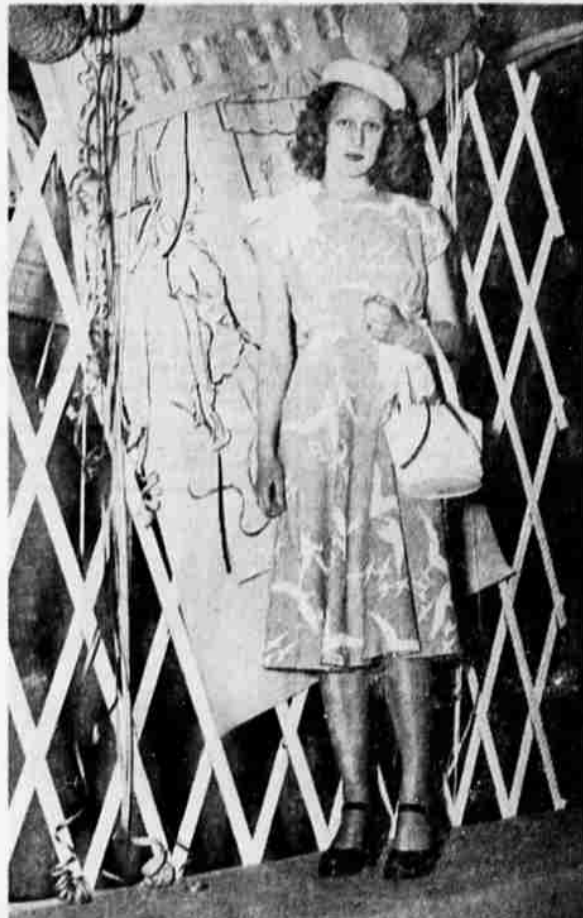

Fund Lack Is Threat To Lake Library

LAKEVIEW, May 21—The possibility that the Lakeview public library will have to be closed for lack of funds next fiscal year (which begins July 1) was expressed Wednesday by Mrs. John Blair, president of the Lakeview Library association.

The statement followed the action last week of the town budget committee in omitting the library fund from the 1948-49 proposed budget. She said that to operate a library with even mediocre service \$1940 from the town was seriously needed.

Mrs. Blair said that members of the association were in favor of closing the library entirely rather than try to give less than the mediocre service which would be necessary under the \$8000 fund offered by the county budget committee.

Redhead Held In Shooting

NEWARK, N. J., May 21 (AP)—A Newark police captain was killed today in his headquarters office by a bullet from his service revolver, and a 39-year-old red-haired waitress was held for questioning.

Police Capt. Thomas J. Rowe, 55, a veteran of nearly 33 years on the force, succumbed about an hour after being shot at first precinct headquarters, which he commands.

Essex County Prosecutor Duane E. Minard said the woman, identified by police as Mrs. Ann Powers, formerly of Uniontown, Pa., was being questioned by city and county detectives.

No charge has been made against her.

Police Chief John Haller said Rowe and the woman walked into first precinct headquarters shortly after 4 a. m. and went to the captain's office.

Ten minutes later Lieut. William Villie, on duty at the information desk, heard a single shot and saw the woman running from the office.

Haller said she was employed as a waitress in a local bar and apparently had joined Capt. Rowe after finishing her work early this morning.

OIC Head May Quit Post In Red Issue Row

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—Commerce Secretary Sawyer today rejected a congressman's request that he drop a high commerce department official whose 22-year-old daughter works here for Tass, the Russian news agency.

Sawyer said Rep. Crawford (R-Mich.) had suggested that Sawyer "request the resignation" of the official, John C. Virden of Cleveland, Ohio, head of the department's office of industry cooperation (OIC).

But Sawyer, a Cincinnati lawyer who took office as secretary only

two weeks ago, released a letter to Crawford saying:

1. Asking Virden's resignation "is unnecessary, as he has already tendered his resignation without suggestion from me."

2. Virden's daughter associated herself with a communist group "against his wishes," and Virden is "vigorously opposed" to communism, and is "in no way disqualified" to hold his government post.

3. "I shall ask him to remain, but if he feels that he does not wish to have his personal family affairs the subject of further public discussion I shall acquiesce in his decision."
