

City Dads Table Matter Of Re-Lighting City In Face Of \$800,000 Cost

City councilmen agreed Monday night that "the city of Klamath Falls is probably one of the worst lighted in the United States," but possibilities for remedying the situation collapsed before an estimated cost of \$800,000.

Previous studies of the lighting set-up have shown that the \$800,000 will cover only the initial cost for re-lighting the entire city.

Although Councilman A. F. Conroy urged appointment of a committee to study means of financing the project, the whole affair was tabled, to be taken up again when all councilmen are present.

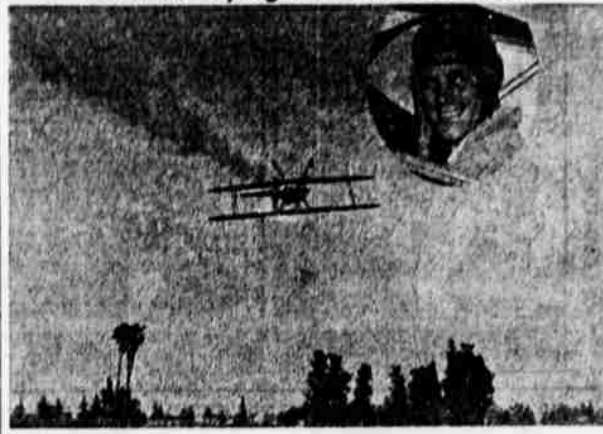
Sheriff Deaver Young said the paid had a murder-suicide pact. She fired five shots through the county jail window but missed.
