Mrs. Gerald Wilson, Guild president, welcomed the guests, and devotions were by Mrs. Chester J. Main.

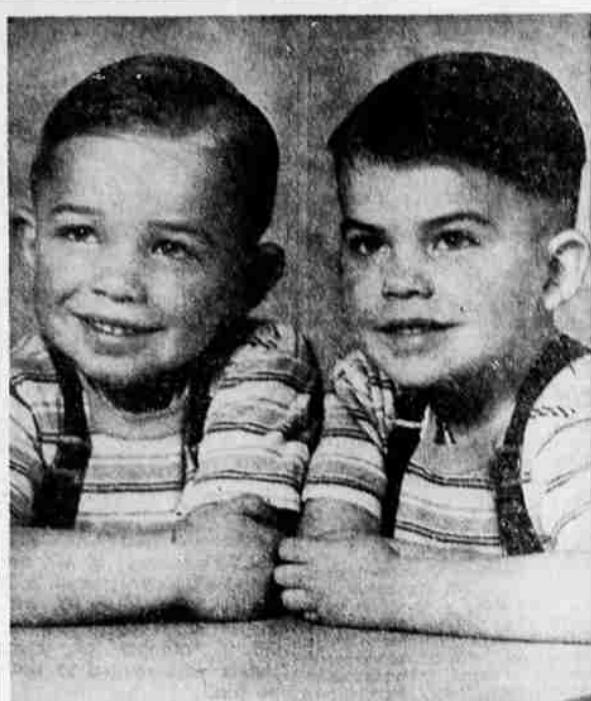
Mrs. Roy Saarni, accompanied by Helene Fischer, played two violin numbers, "Hungarian Melody in B" and "Mighty Like a Rose."

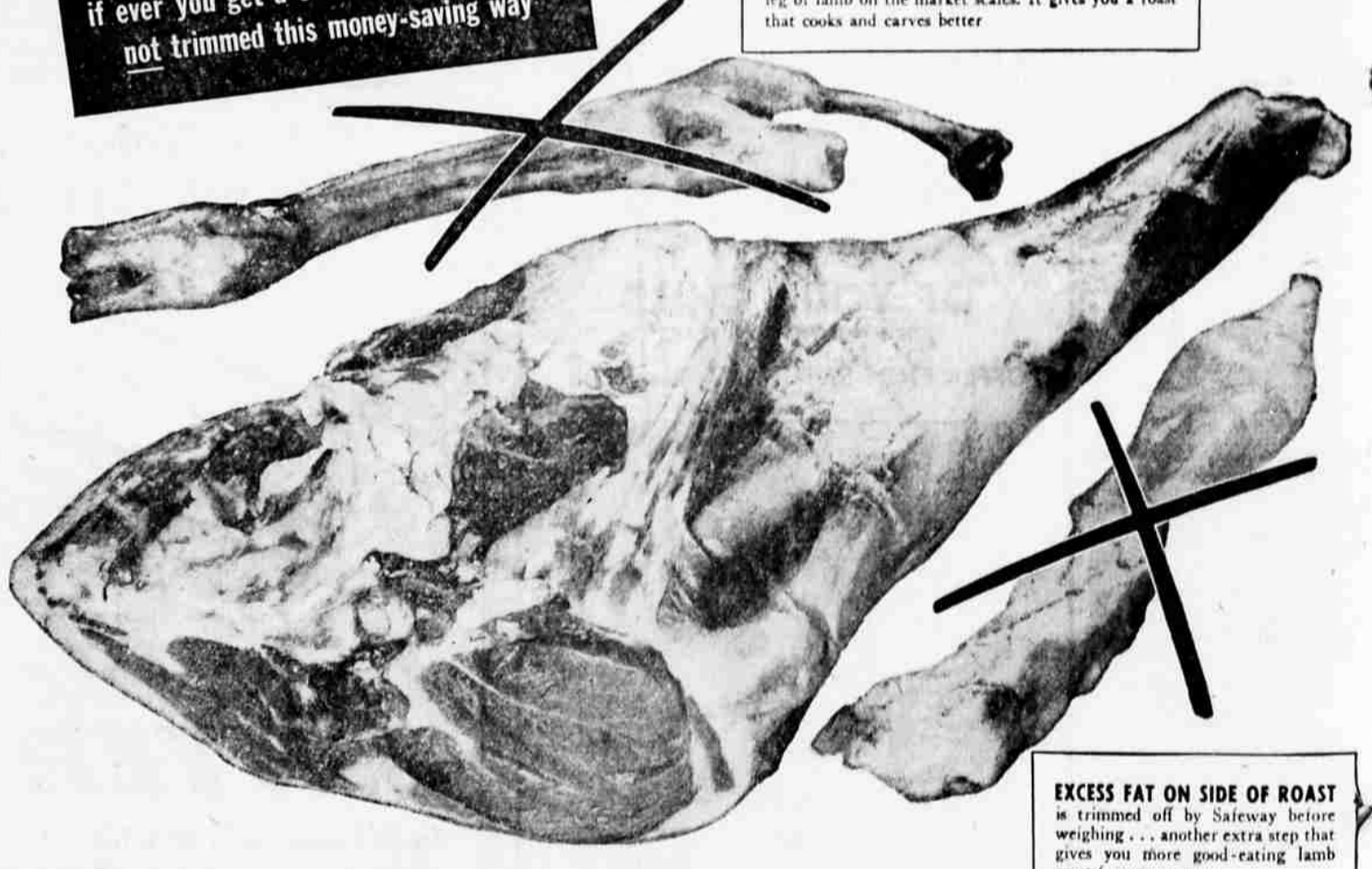
