### Road Levy OK Catches Court Unprepared

Approval by the voters last Friday of a three-mill property tax for county roads must have come as a surprise even to the county court and road department, sponsors of the ballot measure.

They haven't figured out where the money is to be spent.

County Judge U. E. Reeder said today that on July 1 he expected the county to embark on a road-improvement program but the program had not been outlined and he did not know where the tax levy money is going to be applied first.

He said that the promise made the voters was that main county roads would be oiled and that roads bearing school bus and mail route traffic were considered the main ones.

If the county starts spending the money July 1, at the start of the next fiscal year, it will be spending money it does not have. In governmental circles that practice is known as "deficiency spending."

The money voted by taxpayers, about \$117,000 a year for three years at present assessed valuations of property, will not start coming in until next fall, October or November, when people start paying 1948-49 taxes.

By starting to spend in July, much of the first year's allotment will be already used before any comes in at all. The county will simply issue warrants for the money, warrants that are good at face value but which the county will have to pick up when the tax money does come in. That will cost a little interest on each one, say 4 per cent.

### Traffic Is Big Problem

Not the least of the city's troubles these days is traffic congestion since construction began on the north entrance highway. One of the worst spots, under consideration by city councilmen, is at the underpass at Main and Spring.

Heavy traffic has been re-routed off Esplanade, and has added to the load at the underpass where Main, E. Main and Spring intersect. The city council two weeks ago referred the matter to the traffic safety council for study but no action has been taken.

Previous attempts at regulating traffic by means of the traffic lights at the intersection proved to be not too successful. Police Chief Orville Hamilton explained that the lights operate too slowly for traffic from both Main and E. Main to clear the intersection. Some adjustment to the timing of the lights might help, he said, but that would call for the services of a lighting engineer.

The lights were originally installed by the state highway department when the underpass was built. The traffic safety council is expected to make some recommendation soon.

### Girls Hold Play Day

Girls softball Play Day, including 160 girls from 8-A and 8-B teams, was held Monday on Modoc field with 16 teams made up of students from grades 6 to 7, representing Mills, Riverside, Fremont, Pelican, Roosevelt and Fairview schools. This is an annual event.

Three hours of good competitive play on a consolation-elimination tournament schedule made up the day's program. Each team was represented by a color and wherever possible, two girls from five of the six schools participating, were allowed to play on the same team.

Red of B tournament won over the Purples in the finals. The winning team from A tournament also wore the Red armband, winning over Purples by one point.

### Drunk Driving Cases Slated

Justice of the Peace J. A. Mahoney said Tuesday he has at least two and possibly three trials coming up in his court on charges of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor but cannot set dates until District Attorney Clarence A. Humble returns from his home state of Minnesota where he was called recently by a death in his family.

One trial is that of Glen Terrill, county tax assessor, which has been on the books for over a month and which has been postponed twice. Another is that of Scott McKendree, which has been held up for about two months. Both Terrill and McKendree have pleaded not guilty and are free on bail.

The third probably will be that of Roland E. Wright, 635 Alameda, who was arrested Sunday night. Wright posted \$175 bail and was due to enter a plea to the charge Tuesday afternoon.

### Write-In Votes Slow Up Work Of Ballot Counting

Write-in votes are making slow work of the official tabulation of ballots cast in Friday's primary elections but by Tuesday morning the official counters had worked out only one tally sheet where the write-ins might mean anything.

Where there is a candidate for each party to take most of the votes, the write-ins do not amount to much. But where one party had a vacancy on the ballot, the write-ins theoretically can nominate.

For instance, D. E. Van Vactor was unopposed on the GOP ticket for district attorney and naturally got that party's nomination. There was no democratic candidate on the ballot so the person who received the greatest number of write-in votes gets the nomination.

When the official count is over, the person who got the most write-ins on the democratic ballot will be sent a certificate of nomination.

If he wishes to accept, his name will be put on the November general election ballot.

It so happens that the count shows D. E. Van Vactor getting the most write-ins for district attorney on the democratic ballot so he may end up with the nomination of both parties.

Virtually every other attorney in the county has at least one write-in vote and Clarence A. Humble, present district attorney, is running second to Van Vactor.

### Truck-Car In Wreck

An auto accident Monday afternoon at Spring and Main resulted in a charge of failure to yield the right of way being placed against Lloyd K. Shoup, 38, driver of a U. S. government truck. Shoup is due for a trial in municipal court June 15.

The truck collided with a sedan driven by James Derrah, 24, of 1343 Crescent right at the Main street underpass. Both vehicles were extensively damaged but there were no injuries.

Other city police arrests the past 24 hours included those of two Indians who were fined \$25 each and given 10 day jail sentences for possession of intoxicants. The Indians, Johnny Kennedy, 28, of Death Valley, Calif., and Jeff Hull, 32, Chillicothe, had two quart bottles of beer in possession when arrested. Hull said he bought the beer at an East Main tavern.

An automobile race out S. 6th late Monday night brought arrests to William C. Myers, 21, 2026 Applegate, and Ivan R. Hagerty, 22, 2941 Montellus, on charges of speeding.

The arresting officer reported that Hagerty's car was leading that driven by Myers by a scant six feet. Myers was also charged with following another car too close and posted \$10 bail. Hagerty was released.

Blinded by a fog of dust, Lawrence W. Shipp of Chemult either struck or was struck by a car at mid-afternoon Monday near Chemult on highway 97. The 25-year-old superintendent for Hyman Michaels company, a railroad dismantling firm, was rushed by Professional Ambulance service to Hillside hospital.

The attending physician said Shipp had a possible skull fracture, large laceration of the scalp, minor injuries to the knee and chest and is suffering from shock and bruises.

Shipp said he was driving on the highway when he was blinded by the dust and then there was a crash. It is thought that a truck was also involved but there were no other injuries. Shipp's condition is good. He and his wife live at the Singing Pines hotel at Chemult while he is working in that area.

Specifically the young ex-convict is accused of taking \$58.75 worth of tackle from a car owned by H. W. Moody, 517 Laguna. Moody signed the larceny complaint.

Bashinsky told officers he has previously served seven months in prison in Colorado for grand larceny.

### Mrs. Bosworth, Fluhrer Named

MEDFORD, May 26—Final returns from the primary election shows Henry Fluhrer with a strong lead of 4640 to 3719 against O. H. Bengtson in their race for republican nomination for Jackson county state senator. Fluhrer, Southern Oregon bakery operator, is virtually assured of election inasmuch as democrats put up no candidate.

Mrs. Harlan P. Bosworth, formerly of Klamath Falls, was among four candidates nominated without opposition to two places in the legislature from Jackson county. Democrats nominated J. P. Graham with 2569 votes and Mrs. Bosworth with 2246 votes. Republicans re-nominated Frank Van Dyke with 5259 votes, and nominated Ben Day with 4415 votes.

### Klamathite Held For Liquor Sale

Ivan Schuley, 46, resident of the Cozy hotel, has been arraigned on a federal felony charge of selling liquor to an Indian and is held in the county jail in lieu of \$2500 bail.

Schuley was arrested by city police in a Klamath avenue beer hall Sunday after he allegedly furnished an Indian man, Richard Biss, with a quart of wine.

An officer observed Schuley call the Indian into a wash room and went in to find Biss opening the bottle.

Officers said that this is the first time Schuley had been booked for selling liquor although he had been watched for a long time. Biss pleaded guilty in municipal court to a charge of possession and was fined \$25 with an additional 10-day jail term.

Turned over to federal officers, Schuley was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas and requested a preliminary hearing.
