

# Salt Lake City Sunk During Maneuvers

## Battered Old Hulk Blasted To Bottom By 15 Ships And Scores Of Airplanes

WITH THE U. S. FIRST FLEET, May 26 (AP)—Two weeks of maneuvers ended yesterday when the U. S. first task force off the California coast.

The end came at 1:52 p. m. (Pacific daylight time) yesterday after five hours of intermittent bombardment with everything 15 ships and scores of planes had to offer.

The famous old swabbered fighting ship went down without protest—almost gracefully—as it was welcomed death under fire to destruction in a junk yard.

She rolled over and hid her grotesquely twisted masts and other wounds in the kindly sea. Her stern rose and then she slid beneath the waves, bow first.

Her grave is 130 miles off the Southern California coast. She went down in 2000 fathoms, more than two miles of water. There no diver can ever disturb her.

Adm. C. D. Ramsey, commander

of the Pacific fleet, who witnessed the sinking, said: "In general the functioning of material was excellent. The Salt Lake City, a grand veteran of war and peace, has completed her last service. A final well done."

The early stages of the bombardment were limited in order to prolong the practice.

Machinegun bursts and rockets stripped the cruiser of her frills.

Five, six and eight-inch shells were hurled—some missing but many scoring hits. One-hundred, 300 and 1000-pound bombs tore chunks from her sides and superstructure.

Hit By Torpedo

She was still riding the waves, with only a slight list to port, until the first torpedo struck at approximately 1:30 p. m. It tore a hole in her port bow and she gradually keeled over. Fires broke out fore and aft.

The first apparently were due to paint and other inflammable material still aboard the ship. She carried no fuel or ammunition.

Her main deck was almost awash when the second "fish" hit amidships—fired by Cmdr. E. P. Madley of the Bronx, New York, from the submarine Blenny.

Committal Service

As the Salt Lake City went down, navy committal services were held on the submarine tender Nerues, standing off a couple of miles.

The Salt Lake City was built at Camden, N. J., 19 years ago.

She took part in 31 Pacific war engagements. Probably her narrowest escape was in the Kommandor-shore fight—the longest surface engagement of the war. Her engines went dead in the running battle with a Japanese force.

She was one of the targets in the Bikini atom bomb tests of two years ago and was still radioactive. A tug towed her out from San Pedro for her final day at sea.

### Stassen Says 9 Delegates To Back Him

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—Harold Stassen claimed Tuesday that nine of the 12 republican convention delegates elected in Oregon last week may eventually support him for the GOP presidential nomination.

In the primary, Stassen was defeated in the popular vote by Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

Under Oregon law, the 12 delegates must support Dewey for the nomination as long as the New York governor is a contender, Stassen pointed out to a news conference.

But if Dewey fails to win the nomination, Stassen said, the nine then are expected to support Stassen.

The former Minnesota governor made public a telegram he sent to Robert A. Elliott of Portland, chosen

as a delegate at large, advising Elliott and other Stassen supporters to support Dewey "no longer as he is in the race."

Aides to Stassen said that Ted Gamble, who was national director of the war bond drives, will be appointed Stassen's convention manager. A formal announcement is expected to be made soon.

### Portland Milk Supply Sufficient

PORTLAND, May 26 (AP)—The state milk control board has reported that for the first time since before the war the Portland area has enough grade A milk.

The board said no new applications for quotas can be considered before August. Grade A butterfat supply exceeded demand by about 10 per cent in April. The city uses about 17,000 pounds of butterfat daily.

Grade B milk is due to be banned from the Portland supply after July 1.

### Stiff Fine For Bogus Lottery

PASADENA, Calif., May 26 (AP)—If you happen to hold a lottery ticket marked "Nova Scotia Hospital Sweepstakes" you can tear it up now.

Fred L. Conklin Jr., 33, admitted in federal court Monday that he disposed of more than 3000 worth of lottery tickets for the event.

"Was there such a sweepstakes?" asked Federal Judge William C. Mathes.

"No sir, Canada does not allow lotteries," replied Conklin, operator of an electrical appliance store.

"Under the circumstances I think you had better contribute \$25 per month for the next five years to a legitimate charity — and sentence will be suspended for that period," ruled the judge.

Conklin pleaded no contest to a charge of interstate transportation of lottery tickets.
